PRINCIPAL'S REPORT FOR PRIZE GIVING 2018



Chaplain, members of the Trinity College Board of Governors, Chief Guest and Mrs Gunaratne, distinguished guests, teachers, parents, and Boys and Old Boys of this great Institution. It gives me great pleasure to welcome you all to this year's Prize Giving at Trinity College, Kandy.

To begin with, let me say a few words about our Chief Guest to you:

Maithri Gunaratne was Educated at S. Thomas College, Mount Lavinia and then at Law College in Sri Lanka. He is a distinguished Criminal Lawyer and member of the Attorney General's Department. He has also been a member of the Southern Provincial council for 15 years.

Mr Gunaratne has held a number of non-legal positions; most notably, as Chairman of Lanka Coal Company and Mineral Sands Corporation, both Government-owned corporations.

Mr Gunaratne was recently appointed a "Presidents Council" the highest distinction for a lawyer in Sri Lanka. And he has also just become Governor of the Central Province.

Sir, please forgive me for saying this... as an illustrious alumnus of the institution known as the "School by the Sea", it is both a pleasure and an honour to welcome you to the institution simply known as "the best School of all"!

Before I ask the Governor to say a few words let me speak about the past year and share with you my updated vision for the future of Trinity College. There is so much happening here at the school now that I cannot possibly refer to it all now as we would be here all night if I did. The full version of my Report on the Year will once again be published on the College website though even that cannot cover everything that has been going on. I am pleased to say that so many important developments are now happening at Trinity. All these have been introduced for the benefit of the boys and with the intention of restoring Trinity to its rightful position.

We must never forget that children primarily come to school to work, even though extra-curricular activities remain valuable and enjoyable. In the past, maybe exam results did not matter that much for many Trinitians. There were plenty of opportunities to be successful without them.

However, the world has completely changed. Nowadays, if children are to achieve any sort of career success, they will almost certainly need a degree. If not, in this rapidly changing world, they will simply not be able to impress potential employers, even if they have been to Trinity.

New initiatives in 2018

There are far too many new initiatives taking place at Trinity to list them all here. Some of them are purely academic – including the introduction of London A Levels and of new technology-based subjects in the Local system.

More and more boys in the Junior and Middle School are now opting for English Medium, though that does not mean we will be getting rid of either Sinhala or Tamil medium, assuming that there is demand for them.

And in the Junior School, thanks to the generosity of Old Boys, before the end of 2019, there will be state-of-the-art Smartboards in every classroom in the Junior School; linked to this, all boys at this level are now benefiting from a completely new IT syllabus, put together by Chamira Athauda, our Director of IT, and Dr Asitha Bandaranaike, an Old Boy working at Peradeniya. He is also a Junior School parent and the new secretary of the PTA. From this year, even our 5-year-olds in Grade 1 are being introduced to Programming and Coding. And our Grade 5 boys are now basically doing the same level of computing as those currently doing Local A Level IT.

In terms of extra-curricular initiatives, we are now offering about a hundred different clubs & Societies at the school.

Whilst many of these have been part of Trinity for generations, a number are brand new to Trinity, reflecting interests of the teachers as well as the changing world we now live in. So alongside old favourites like the TCLA, Young Farmers', Astronomy, Automotive, Commerce, Western and Oriental Music and Heritage Societies, we now offer ones as diverse as Design, Media, Young Inventors, Environment, Aquatic, Culinary, Model United Nations and the Peace Circle.

And, of course, there are a number of Technology-based Societies too, at all levels of the school. Whilst Senior boys are strongly encouraged to take part in as many of them as they can, all boys in the Junior and Middle School are now required to select 4 different Clubs & Societies to do each week during the period after lunch.

Involvement in all these activities will certainly help boys to develop holistically and creatively, thereby becoming more rounded and interesting people. They should also be enjoyable and stimulating too!

Also, we are also reinvigorating Social Service, for so long a vital component of Trinity life. It was one of many things which had faded away, but which we are now revitalising. For me, it is crucial that our boys grow up with an understanding that they need to display genuine care and concern for those who are not so fortunate. We are actually now starting this at the very bottom of the school.

Following examples found in other countries, our Kindergarten boys are now regularly going to visit an Elders' Home nearby. Not only do the elders love spending time with the little ones, but the children have a great time too.

Admissions

Admission to Trinity is more competitive than ever. So it is vital that the whole process is transparent, comprehensible and (above all) fair. I am very grateful to the Admissions Committee for their professionalism, integrity and hard work last year. I can assure everyone that the process was conducted in a totally fair and honest way and the objective points system which was brought in by the Board for Grade 1 was rigidly adhered to by all members of the Committee.

Despite attempts by one or two old boys and even a former Senior Board member to benefit illegally from admissions, no boys were admitted through the back door.

As I said last year, Trinity has been a leading school for so many years, and we must set the highest standards for ourselves in terms of professionalism, honesty and integrity. This is true in all areas of school life, but particularly in the admissions process where, as you all know, corruption and dishonesty are commonplace, even in top schools within Sri Lanka. I fear that may have been the case at Trinity in the past, but it must not be so in the future. So every one of the 220 boys who joined Trinity last year entered through the front door.

Academic Results

Academically, 2018 was another very good year for Trinity at GCE Public Examinations. Trinity boys achieved high rankings, including coming District first and second in Commerce. 13 boys achieved 3 A Grades. Their names are all listed in the full report.

Overall, 234 students sat for the A Level examination with 133 students qualifying to apply for university entrance. That is 55.6% of the total.

I am delighted to report that the 2017 O Level results were extremely good. There was a pass rate of 98.4%, up on the previous year, and 253/257 boys who sat their O Levels in December 2017 qualified to do A Levels. An impressive 35 boys achieved 9 As (a slight increase on last year). Nearly 60% of all boys achieved 5 or more A Grades. For a school with non-selective entry, this is a genuinely good result.

I am very proud of all boys who did well in their academic studies, especially those who managed to combine excellent academic results with significant contribution to Sport or other extra-curricular areas of Trinity life. I wish those who are now leaving College all the very best in their further studies and careers. And I know they would like me to thank all those teachers who helped them achieve their potential.

Sport

In terms of sport, the Prefect of Games tells me we are actively competing at about 20 different sports here at Trinity. Whilst this is great in many ways, we need to make sure that we do not spread ourselves too thinly by encouraging boys to specialise in only one sport; particularly not when they are young.

In the old days, school sport in Sri Lanka (like most western countries) was divided into seasons. Boys were therefore able to compete even at senior level, in at least three different sports during the year. As proof of this, there are plenty of triple coloursmen amongst the Old Boys, with Colours or Lions in Rugby, Cricket and Athletics.

Nowadays, there seems to be a belief (clearly disproved around the world) that school sports results improve if students only play one sport. So, for instance, our 1st XV rugby players will, this year, have had 7 months of pre-season training for a season that lasts only 3 months. The 1st XI cricketers, on the other hand, have no official pre-season, but instead play a large number of tournament and traditional matches from September right through to at least March (it was May last year).

Is this one-track approach really educationally beneficial to the boys, I wonder? Or to the development of sport in the country? Variety, as they say, is the spice of life; and it certainly helps young people to grow up into balanced, interesting adults.

I really wish we could get back to that system; but it is impossible for Trinity to do so unilaterally. All of the Principals and parents I have spoken to agree with me about this, but for it to work, there has to be agreement and cooperation between the Governing bodies of all school sports.

At the moment, they do not seem inclined to talk to each other. However, what we have now done here at Trinity is return our Junior School to its old system of separate seasons, where boys are encouraged to play three different sports each term.

Evidence suggests that the so-called major sports will benefit from this, both because skills are transferable and also more boys will be inclined to carry on with them further up the school. At the moment, for instance, only about 10% of our boys actually play either rugby or cricket. In a relatively small school by Sri Lankan standards, we cannot realistically hope to compete regularly at the highest level in a major team sport unless our best natural sportsmen are playing that sport.

I hope that other schools will follow Trinity's lead in returning to a system of separate seasons, including at the top of the school, where boys also have to balance their studies with sport, as I said earlier.

As they get close to public exams, they clearly need to rein back on their extra-curricular involvement, but they really should not need to stop playing sport altogether. As the poet Juvenal's famous saying from ancient Roman times goes, Mens sana in corpore sano (a healthy mind lives in a healthy body). Contrary to what many parents tell their children, that remains true even when O and A Levels come along.

As I stated earlier, Sport remains a very important part of Trinity life. There is a huge quantity and variety of sporting opportunities available for boys throughout the school. I have included as much as I can in my written Report, to be published online, but apologise if I have missed out something, such is the range and extent of sporting achievement at Trinity, both by teams and individuals.

As for now, in this speech, I will just pick up a few highlights of the last sporting year at Trinity.

1. Athletics

Trinity became Zonal Meet champions for the 22nd consecutive year. The athletes toured to India to take part in a meet where they had a great experience. The Junior Relay team was especially successful. The 2018 Inter House Athletic meet was a huge success and the senior competition was won by Oorloff House.

2. Basketball

At the Trinity Thomian annual encounter Damsith Aluthgedara and Milinda Sirimanne was awarded the most offensive player in Under 16 and Under 19. The House tournament was a big success, and was won by Lemuel House.

3. Badminton

We are in a development phase of school badminton. As such, our results have not been that impressive this year. However, we did become All-Island Schools Under 11 champions, which is very encouraging for the future.

4. Boxina

Trinity won 5 medals at the Stubbs Shield, and were runners-up at the 45th L.V. Jayaweera All Island Boxing Tournament among 64 schools. But the undoubted highlight of Boxing this year is that we became Champions (for the 1st time in 49 years) of the T. B. Jayah All Island Boxing tournament competing with 41 schools. This great achievement was fittingly marked by the Kandy OBA, who generously hosted a felicitation ceremony for the boxers and their coaches at the Earl's Regency Hotel.

5. Cricket

The 1st XI had a very successful season and became All Island Runners Up. Hasitha Boyagoda was adjudged the Observer Mobitel School Boy Cricketer of the year. He also kept a world record at the Under 19 world cup by scoring 191 runs. He also did very well in the Schools Cricket season and in the Under 19 international level. Present Captain Pubudu Bandara and Fast Bowler Ruvin Peiris also represented the Sri Lanka under 19. We won the 50-over Match against St Anthony's comfortably, whilst winning the 1st Innings in the Big Match itself.

Whilst thanking all the coaches for their hard work, especially Kavinda Jayasuriya and Rushan Jaleel, my particular thanks go to Nilantha Rathnayake, Amil Ramanadhan and others in the Cricket Foundation for all the support they continue to give in order to raise the standards of Cricket at Trinity. And as he takes a well-deserved back seat (hopefully just for a while), I would also like to take this chance to express my gratitude to Mr. Bilal Fassy, our primary Cricket Sponsor for many years. The current success of Trinity cricket owes much to his generosity and enthusiasm.

6. Chess

At the All Island Inter School Chess championship Trinity Under 13 and 17 teams became 2nd Runner up. The Chess Inter house Under 13 and 15 tournaments were a big success.

7. Golf

A growing number of boys of all ages are now playing golf regularly. I am very grateful to Victoria Golf and Country Club (managed by Old Boy Asela Wavita) for their generous support of Trinity golf, as well as a number of other Old Boys (led by Bimal Fernando and Ravana Wijeyeratne) for their enthusiasm and efforts to increase the opportunities for our boys to become good golfers. We even had a successful Inter-house Golf tournament in 2018 for the first time ever.

8. Hockey

The Hockey team played some good hockey in 2018, though our results were not great at the Senior Level. Our Juniors, though, look very promising and did very well. At the annual TPT Hockey carnival, the Under 14 became group champions whilst the Under 16 were runners-up. We were Under 16 group champions at the Kandy Hockey Sixers. And at the Sri Lanka Inter Schools Hockey Carnival 2018 our Under 14 boys received the Gold Star (effectively winners). Finally, the House tournament was also held successfully for the first time in many years.

The Trinity Hockey Foundation (led by Deva Ellepola) is helping to revitalise the sport at Trinity by supporting and advising the School. They are, of course, supported in this by the former Vice Principal Mr Paul Jeyaraj, who personally ran Trinity Hockey for many years, taking it to great heights.

9. Karate

Osanda Bandara, Sudesha Jayasinghe, Randil Weerakoon and Nadeesh Illukkumbura represented Sri Lanka in the 15th Asia Pacific Shitoryu Karate Championship and Commonwealth games in Indonesia and South Africa respectively.

10. Rugger

Though the Under 20 didn't have a great season (coming 6th in the League), other age groups had much more success in 2018, including the Under 14 team, who finished runners-up in their tournament. 25 of our present players had a successful training camp in New Zealand during August and September. And I am delighted to say that Inter house rugby resumed once again after many years. Boys trained hard and represented their house with great pride in the competition which was held in a carnival atmosphere at Nittawela. Lemuel House emerged worthy winners.

I call on all stakeholders, including Old Boys and parents, to rally behind our rugby players this season, and remember that the boys are doing their best at all times and sacrificing so much for their school.

We also need to remember that these are children not professionals; their young bodies should not be mistreated or abused; and they need to do their academic studies too. I am confident that Scrummage agrees with me on this.

11. Swimming

Mindiya Jayasinghe and Avon Dikdeniya was selected to represent Sri Lanka at the 54th Malaysia International Age Group Swimming Championship. At the Provincial Sportsmeet Trinity College emerged Overall Champions.

Many thanks to the Old Boy Swimming Foundation for their continued support and leadership of swimming at Trinity. I am also delighted to see them working closely with both the Coaching Staff and the Parents in order to uplift the standard of Trinity swimming to something like its former glory.

12. Soccer

Soccer continues to grow and flourish at the school, with an increasing number of boys playing it at both Junior and Senior levels. Trinity became 2nd runner up in the Provincial Football tournament. The Inter House football tournament was conducted very successfully and was won by Garrett House.

The highlight of the year in soccer is that we easily beat Royal College 3-0 in the 3rd Annual Encounter. The Footballers also had a successful overseas tour to India where they played 12 competitive matches (W4, D4, L4).

13. Table Tennis

At the annual Trinity Thomian encounter, Trinity Won the under 19 Match. And at the National School games Trinity was placed 3rd in the Under 17 and 20 age groups.

14. Tennis

Trinity placed 1st in the Boys Doubles category at the Mahaweli Reach Junior Tennis Championship

15. Weight-lifting

Trinity not only emerged Central provincial Champions but also All Island School games under 20 champions as well as Senior, Junior and Youth Nationals Under 20 Mens Champions.

B. J. Wijewickrema, E. R. Bodinarayana, P. D. Jayasuriya and G. G. K. J. Gamage were adjudged Best Lifters and G. G. K. J. Gamage performed brilliantly to achieve a New Junior National record and win the title.

Weight Lifting had another superb season in 2018, and I am especially proud that Trinity became the All-Island Under 20 Champions once again. This is an outstanding achievement, for which credit must go to the coaching staff as well as to the weightlifters themselves. You will have a chance to applaud the boys later when they come up as winners of the Team of the Year Award.

I would like to thank the Prefect of Games, and all the Coaches and MICs for their efforts this year. And my thanks, too, to the Vice Principal and Headmasters for their help in ensuring that the sports' programme runs smoothly but does not interfere with the academic side of school life... at least not as much as it used to.

The welfare and protection of children should be a school's primary concern at all times. As responsible adults we cannot stand by if there is a threat to any child.

All over the world, there are horror stories of respected coaches who have abused young people in their care. Very often, they get away with it for years because their victims are frightened to speak out. Just last week, a scandal rocked South Korea about this. And the official US Gymnastics team doctor was recently jailed for life for abusing young gymnasts over many years. This happened in countries which already have legal measures to safeguard children.

Here in Sri Lanka, however, there are currently no legal procedures in place to check that those who are working closely with children are actually safe to do so. I urge the Government to look into this situation on a National Level for the protection of all children here in Sri Lanka.

Here at Trinity, all coaches have to sign the Code of Conduct and adhere to it if they wish to remain. We are also conducting more due diligence before appointing them in the first place. I am pleased to say that there are now very few concerns raised by parents. I am sure that, at least in part, this is because Coaches now know exactly what is expected of them here at Trinity in terms of their behaviour, integrity and treatment of the boys in their care. They also know that we are keeping a close eye on them.

Co-curricular Activities

Trinity has always had a huge number of Co-curricular activities, catering for children of all ages, abilities, faiths and interests. I cannot possibly mention all of them here today, as we would be here all night if I did. I have tried to include as many of these activities as possible in the written report, but will just pick out a few highlights now.

Religious Societies: Trinity is an Anglican Foundation, and we remain a proudly Christian School. However, as has always been the case, we welcome boys and teachers from all religions. So I am pleased that, once again, all four of our Religious Societies organised highly successful and well-attended events this year. It is important that we teach all children to be tolerant and accepting of others, whatever their religion, culture and backgrounds.

Tamil Literary Union: 2018/19 is the centenary year of the TLU. We have already started a series of special events to commemorate this remarkable achievement. Everything will build up to a major celebration planned for October this year. As soon as the date is finalised, we will publish it on our website and Social Media pages, in the hope that as many former members of the TLU will come and join us on that evening.

The Interact Club: Interact Club Being the oldest Interact Club of the Hill Country, initiated the Interact Year with the 41st Installation Ceremony, which was conducted with grandeur and opulence, with the participation of many schools.

The Traditional New Year Celebrations organized by the Interact Club for the first time and the Annual Medical Camp with Trinity Doctors' Association, with all the facilities, for the staff of Trinity College were the most highlighted events of the year. Interactors participated in number of events conducted by the Rotary Club and Interact District 3220.

Young Farmers' Club: This year, the young farmers club have truly espoused their ethos of Young agriculturists that of distinctive agricultural techniques, proven excellence and Scientific work.

From a field work perspective, it has certainly been a year of achievement, being able to conduct a research on gastrointestinal parasites in wild pigs and publish an international scientific paper on Nematode infection in wild pigs.

Also, while concentrating with greater emphasis on Animal parasitological science, they enthusiastically went about about raising the bar on technology in the intensive cultivation of local underutilized crops. This positioned them to exceed the goals they had set for themselves. This included in TCKYFC being positioned as a Centre of Knowledge and Technology which has seen Trinity being upheld as a role model in the field of agriculture.

Adding value to these, they also lead the way in Artificial insemination in poultry, Forest dieback phenomena in Horton plains National Park and Ornamental fish breeding. It has certainly been a busy and successful year for the Young Farmers Club!

Automotive Society: The year 2018 had been an eventful year for the society, an industrial visit was organized to the DIMO Lanka showrooms, maintenance facilities and the DATS training institute in Colombo, which was a very informative and useful visit for the members, and it was the first time exposure of most students for the Mercedes Benz automotive legacy. Students of Grades 10 and 11, who follow the subject of "Design and Mechanical Technology" for their GCE O/L examination were taken for an industrial visit to the Railway Workshops, Ratmalana. They are looking forward to a successful year ahead.

The Media Unit: The media unit of Trinity College Kandy rendered their unstinting service to all college programmes from photography to sounds and announcing.

The Media Unit is in the process of learning sports commentary and also looking for possibilities to start up a radio station. We are extremely grateful to the batch of 92 for donating the most needed facility at the main hall which is a proper sound system and multimedia facility.

It was a challenging year but all members took up every challenge very positively and gave their fullest cooperation to make it a successful year.

Kandyan Drum & Dance Troupe: The Trinity College National Drum & Dance Troupe participated in several activities inside and outside the College this year. An early highlight of 2018 was their performance on the Chapel Lawn for the Royal Visit of Prince Edward and the Countess of Wessex.

23 young talented Dancers were inducted as Ves Dancers in front of huge gathering at Natha Devela and Trinity College premises. It was the 11th Ves induction Ceremony organized by the Troupe.

The Trinity College National Drum & Dance Troupe entrusted their talents by winning 1st place of Zonal and Provincial levels and finally the 'All Island 1st runner up award for Drum Orchestra' item organized by the ministry of education of Sri Lanka.

The troupe for the first time participated in "Rajjaya Narthana Ullela", an open competition organized by the ministry of cultural affairs of Sri Lanka and won the 1st place in District level and 2nd runner up award in National level for Drum Orchestra item.

They also had the privilege to represent Sri Lanka and Kandy at the 2018 Chengdu International Sister Cities Youth Music Festival which was held in Chengdu, China in July 2018 with more than 30 international delegates. This was another opportunity for our young dancers to perform for our country's honour as well as that of Trinity.

Incidentally, the respect with which the Drum & Dance Troupe is held within Trinity is reflected by the fact that last year's Troupe Leader, Bhagya Ranasinghe, is today's winner of the Ryde Gold Medal.

The Sinhala Literary Union: The Sinhala Literary Union stepping into its 105th consecutive year, organized 'Sahitha' and 'Vaag Prathiba' annual inter-school competitions. 'Vaag Prathiba' the inter-school debating competition which was conducted for the 12th consecutive year as an All-Island event and was a great success. The Championship of the 'Vaag Prathiba' Inter-School Debating Competition was won by Dharmaloka College Kelaniya and Runners-Up was won by Royal College Colombo. Maliyadewa College Kurunegala managed to secure the 3rd Place. The profound lecture which was delivered by the Chief Guest Mr S. A. Dunukepotha was highly appreciated by everyone.

Social Service Union: The year 2018 was a very successful year for the Social Service Union; The Social Service Union was inactive for the last 5 years, the union was re-established by the efforts of our TIC Mrs Abeykoon and the Vice-Principal Mr J.D Wilson.

The first project of the Social Service Union after a decade was the car wash project which raised funds for the Sirimavo Bandaranaike Childrens' Hospital. It was a very cumbersome task to organise a major scale event after the inactive period of the society.

Drop a Coin in Aid of Thalassemic Patients project was also a very successful project by the Social Service Union. The collection was donated to a thalassemic child patient Tharindu Ishara Maldeniya who is expected to undergo a matched related donor bone marrow transplant for thalassemia major at Asiri Central Hospital.

The Social Service Union also donated money to a Girl's home in Anuradhapura and also to a visually handicapped home in Battaramulla for the Flag Day.

Sri Lanka Unites: The year 2018 commenced with a Workshop which was organized by the SLU Chapter of Trinity College under the theme Reconciliation through Leadership. This was held on the 19th of September at the College Main Hall, which focussed on awareness of the core motives of SLU amongst Kandy Schools and further enlighten them in their knowledge and interest for Communal Harmony and Co existence.

"Stride To Ride" a three phase joint project organized by the Sri Lanka Unites Chapters of Trinity College, Kandy and Ladies' College, Colombo was also a very successful event.

The Buddhist Students' Movement: The Buddhist Students' Movement (BSM) of Trinity College Kandy has been an important part of Trinity for more than four decades.

One of the prominent events carried out by the Movement is the overnight Pirith Ceremony followed by the alms giving for Maha Sangha. The 43rd Pirith ceremony was held successfully in the year 2018.

The BSM joined hands with the Heritage Society in helping the underprivileged students in the Palatuwa Primary School in the Dambulla district in the year 2018. In addition the BSM looks forward to donate a library for the above school in collaboration with the Heritage Society.

Trinity College Choir: The Choir, under the guidance of the Choirmaster Mr. Lasantha Tennekoon, were outstanding throughout the year adding. In addition to regular Sunday Services and the Christmas and Easter Services, the choir participated in a number of public events in Colombo and Kandy.

During these events the choir displayed its versatility in performing various genres of music from classical to pop. A real highlight of the School Year was the brilliant "Music from the Movies" Concert which the choir performed in September. They also performed the Hallelujah Chorus for HRH Prince Edward, when he visited Trinity during the year, and at the special service held to mark the Centenary of the Armistice at the end of World War One.

The Culinary Club: The Culinary Club is one of the new clubs formed at the beginning of 2018 that had gained popularity by encouraging the student community to cook as a life skill as well as to direct some of its members towards possible careers within the hospitality sector.

The club meets every Thursday afternoon to engage in practical activities like demonstrations, discussions, presentations in cooking carried out under a special theme for each month of the year.

The club has identified special culinary skills of each member through various projects carried out by them throughout 2018 like providing celebratory food for special occasions of the school, engaging in food sales and visits to the Hotel School Kandy and the reputed Cinnamon Lodge Habarana.

TCLA: The Trinity College Literary Association had a productive year in 2018. The first event of the year was the first full length production at College in more than a decade. The Drama was "The Secret Case of Sherlock Holmes" by Craig Sodaro. The event was a massive success and set the scene for the coming year.

The Drama team also participated in the Y. M. C. A Inter school Shakespeare Competition which was held in the Lionel Wendt. The team also performed their drama several times inside school. "An Appreciation of the Bard" was the name of the Shakespeare festival organized by the TCLA, reviving the festival that was last held over a decade previously. The winners of the All Island Shakespeare Competition, Ananda College joined us for this event.

The TCLA also wrote and produced a drama for the teacher's day celebrations in the third term of the year, which focused on all that the teachers do for their students.

Debating also flourished during 2018, with the team participating in several major competitions. The first of these was the annual friendly Trinity – Thomian debate which was held in the second term as part of the Thomian weekend.

The Debate team also participated in the Ladies College debate competition. Although the team did not achieve great success, the experience they gained was invaluable. The team also won the first place at the inaugural ACBT debate competition, receiving the shield as well as scholarships for all team members

Heritage Society: The Heritage Society has once again taken up the initiative to get boys involved in social welfare. In the year 2018 The Heritage Society and the Buddhist Movement together organized a project to donate stationery needed for the under privileged children in the Palatuwawa Primary School in the outskirts of Dambulla district. It is also expected to build and maintain a school library for the students in the same school.

Library Council: The old boys from Batch of 2000 in collaboration with the College Library council organized a workshop on Design thinking for youth, which was held at the college main hall 27th July 2018 headed by Mr Sanka Hettiarachchi and Prof Suranga Nanayakkara (Associate Professor, University of Auckland). This was designed to nurture the young minds to develop skills on creativity and innovation. Two essential competencies that is required in facing the unknown challenges of the future career landscape. The Library Council carried out many workshops and competitions throughout year 2018.

Karnatic Music Society: The Karnatic Music Society had a successful 2018. The boys participated in many events throughout the Year 2018. At the All Island Schools' Karnatic Music Competition, organized by the Ministry of Education, they came 1st in both Junior and Senior Categories.

Western Music Society: The year 2018 was a tremendously successful one for the Western Music Society of Trinity College Kandy. The achievements of the society can be summarized as follows. At the All Island Western Music and Dance Competition organized by the Ministry of Education Central Province the Senior Choral Group became the winner by obtaining 92 points, Senior Piano Solo (Abhisheka Surendrakumar) Winner by obtaining 89 points.

At the National Level competition the Senior Choral Group became the winners by obtaining 87 points and at the same competition Abhisheka Surendrakumar became the All Island winner by obtaining 92 points. The Senior Choral Group became All Island winners for the 4th consecutive year & Abhisheka Surendrakumar won the Piano Solo for the 3rd year.

At the Sri Lanka Festival of Music, Dance and Speech Central Province Competition our Primary Choir, Middle School Choir and the Senior Choir received Distinction Gold Medals and at the same festival Commended Gold Medals were won by Abhisheka Surendrakumar for Piano Solo U18, Sathira Wijethunga for Piano Solo U16, Harshith Karunaratne & Sathira Wijethunga for Piano Duet U16 and Adithya Herath & Rashmika Herath for Piano Duet Under 11.

Also at the National Competition the Primary Choir, Middle School Choir and the Senior Choir became All Island Winners and Abhisheka Surendrakumar for Piano Solo U18, Sathira Wijethunga for Piano Solo U16, Harshith Karunaratne & SathiraWijethunga for Piano Duet U16 and Adithya Herath & Rashmika Herath for Piano Duet Under 11 were All Island winners at the same Competition.

Special Awards were awarded to Primary Choir for the Best Popular Choir, Senior Choir for Best Choir U 18, Highest number of All Island Awards won by a school for choirs – Trinity College, Kandy – for the 3rd consecutive year and the highest number of Gold Medals & All Island Awards won by a teacher for pianoforte Mrs Chryshanthi Cabral Surendrakumar.

Staff

I am very grateful to those many teachers at Trinity who are happy to go the extra mile for their students; and who willingly contribute to school activities such as Sports and Societies in addition to their classroom work. I am also delighted that many more teachers now are deciding to improve their own professional qualifications and skills, with large numbers of teachers beginning degrees, diplomas and other courses (including ICT and English proficiency). This increasing awareness of the need for Continuous Professional Development is very encouraging; and I can see it is already leading to a more professional atmosphere amongst the staff.

We recently had a visit from two Old Boys living in Australia, who are both experienced in the introduction of Performance Management systems in the Educational and Corporate sectors. In their two weeks here, largely sponsored by the PTA and Old Boys (I'm delighted to say), Peter and Gavin spent time with all teachers at Trinity, starting to raise awareness and implement a formal system of Professional Development and target setting which will be linked to the Bonus incentive scheme being introduced over the course of the next year. They spent most time with the newly appointed Grade Heads and Senior Faculty Heads.

The introduction of Grade Heads here is a much bigger deal than people perhaps realise. For the first time ever at Trinity (or perhaps in Sri Lanka), these specially selected teachers are being asked to support and manage their colleagues rather than just look after the boys (as was the case with Sectional Heads).

So as well as checking that the boys in their Grade are thriving, they are also going to ensure that teachers do those things which they should be doing, but which nobody has really been checking on. I am talking about things like thorough Lesson planning, punctuality and attendance, prompt and full marking of homework, and effective classroom management and discipline. They will also communicate directly with Parents and PTA Grade Reps, to help sort out little issues before they become big ones; and act as a conduit with Management when necessary.

With the appointment of Grade Heads, we are therefore creating a genuine layer of "Middle Management" within the school, which will in turn lead to much better chains of communication and accountability. The Grade Heads report directly to their respective Headmasters, who in turn report to the Vice Principal and me. As you can see, this is indeed a significant change within the school's hierarchy; and it is one which will hopefully benefit teachers, parents and boys themselves. I am most grateful to those 14 outstanding teachers for agreeing to take on this significant extra responsibility.

There are far too many outstanding staff members to mention them all by name; but I would like to express my thanks in particular to my Vice Principal, Mr J.D. Wilson. Shaw has been a strong and active presence around the school. He has helped ensure good discipline and orderly conduct, especially in the Upper School, amongst both students and staff. I am very grateful to him for his hard work and support.

Ananda Marasinghe, the Co Vice Principal and Junior School Headmaster, remains a massive asset to the school. He knows everyone and everything to do with Trinity. If ever I want to find out something, he is the first person I ask.

I would also like to publicly express my thanks to the Chaplain, Sanath Madagamgoda for his wise, balanced, compassionate advice and his strong presence around the school.

And we have indeed been fortunate this past year to welcome back Mr Krishanthan Anthonydas after a gap of about 9 years when he was teaching overseas. Krishanthan has very quickly reintegrated into the school, earning the respect of boys and staff along the way. His calm and measured manner, linked to a very strong sense of right and wrong, made him the ideal choice to be the new Headmaster of the Upper School; a position which he took up in January.

Finally, I would like to thank Nirosha Gunawardane (Finance Manager), Ravi Amarasekera (Head of Administration), Ashanthi Tennekoon (Principal's PA), and Mark Navamani (Admissions Officer). All of them are a pleasure to work with. They and their teams do an outstanding job behind the scenes; often with little thanks.

I thank all of the Staff Leavers for what they have given to Trinity College, over many years in some cases. And I wish them all the very best for the future.

Whilst on the subject of staff, I would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge the immense contribution made to Trinity by Alex Lazarus, who very sadly passed away about 3 months ago. Alex will doubtless go down in Trinity history as one of the legends of the school. He did so much over such a long period of time. Some of it was high profile and very visible, like his work as Senior Boarding Master, or the fact that he was Head Coach of the unbeaten 1987 1st XV Rugby team.

However, as only those who knew him well were aware, so much of Alex's life was spent quietly, generously and selflessly serving others, even at the expense of looking after himself. So although he did not like going to formal Church services, he was actually one of the most Christian people I have had the pleasure of knowing. Like many others who knew him much longer than me, I personally miss Alex hugely; and Trinity is a poorer place without him.

Old Boys

There are so many Old Boys, both in this country and overseas, who are extraordinarily supportive and helpful in every way; who do not make a song and dance about it; and who genuinely want the best for their alma mater. I have met with many Old Boys over the past year, including overseas in London and Toronto, where I was made to feel incredibly welcome last October.

It never ceases to amaze me how many genuinely successful Old Boys there are all over the world, including some here in Sri Lanka of course. And I am always happy to hear ideas and professional wisdom from those people who have achieved so much (in such diverse fields) since they left Trinity. The fact that these people still care so much for Trinity is very humbling.

I have already mentioned the wonderful support given by the Cricket Foundation. I would also like to thank the members of Scrummage for their commitment to Rugby at all levels of the College. Much has been said recently by some people about my disagreements with certain members of Scrummage; and I am not going to pretend that nothing has happened. But this should not disguise the fact that I greatly value their voluntary and wholehearted support of the sport they love so much.

I would like to clarify that, as happens with the Cricket Foundation, all Rugby Coaches (from 1st XV down to Under 10s) are identified, interviewed and recommended by Scrummage; only then are they employed by the school. And, exactly as I said last year, Scrummage remain the men who keep a technical eye on all that is going on at all levels during the season. They have particular expertise in this area; not me, the POG or the MICs.

Scrummage, the Cricket Foundation and the other Old Boy Sports foundations traditionally lend their support on a voluntary basis, despite having very busy lives of their own, because they love Trinity and they love Trinity Sport. I am very grateful to them for all that they do.

I would ask all Trinitians, whether current students or Old Boys, to unite now behind all school teams; and, as the Big Match and Rugby Season rapidly approach, I urge as many people as possible to physically come to matches and support the boys. Having a large and proactive crowd behind them really does make the team feel like they have an extra man on the pitch.

Trinity150

I am very pleased to say that we have passed the point of no return. The Green button has been pressed by the Board of Governors, and the first two major building projects under the Trinity150 banner will be started concurrently within a very few weeks. These are the construction of a new Commerce Block and the complete internal rebuilding of Alison House.

I am hugely grateful to the T150 Advisory and Oversight Committee for their untiring and remarkable work to get us to this stage. Under the inspired Chairmanship of Jayantissa Ratwatte, they have done so much more than oversee the financial integrity of the fund-raising, which is what they were originally formed to do. But in addition to that, they have managed and directed every conceivable part of this massive undertaking. We could never have managed this huge project without them.

In fund-raising terms, we are on track and have currently raised over 100 Million rupees, primarily from Old Boys. This is an amazing achievement, once more spearheaded by the T150 Committee. Along with what the Board can finance this year (none of it from fee income by the way), it is comfortably enough to start and complete the first two projects. But we need more (for the other 3 new buildings and the Napier conversion).

So I also ask the parents of current Trinitians to be as generous as they can. With the exception of those whose sons are about to leave, it is your children who will directly benefit from all the new facilities. Not to mention, in years to come, their sons and grandsons. So parents, please look at the Trinity150 section on the School website, and support the project as generously as you possibly can. Only by planning and building for the future will Trinity ever be able to return to its rightful place as "the best school of all". Trinity150 is a giant step towards achieving that goal.

Conclusion

Let me finish this report by thanking everyone who has helped me this past year; in particular, my Senior Management Team, Teachers and Support Staff. My wife, Viv, continues to be a tower of strength. I'd also like to once again thank the Board of Governors under the chairmanship of the Bishop of Colombo. As I said this time last year: I often wish that everyone knew what a selfless job the Governors do for Trinity. And all on an entirely voluntary basis.

There was a great 18th Century Irish statesman called Edmund Burke, who was himself educated at Trinity College Dublin (after which we are named). He once said "The only thing necessary for the triumph of evil is for good men to do nothing." How right he was! I know it would be so much easier for me personally if I turned a blind eye to incompetence, bullying, immorality and corruption. But, as a Christian and a passionate educationalist I simply can't do so. Even when it makes me unpopular with powerful people, or insulted yet again on social media, I tell you this: everything I do at Trinity, without exception, is done with the best interests of the boys and the school in mind.

The boys need to learn the same core values of compassion, honesty, sportsmanship and generosity of spirit that were learned by their fathers and grandfathers at Trinity. Only if this happens will the school survive and thrive long after all of us on this stage have departed.

On that note, let me end by announcing the name of the new Senior Prefect. We have left the appointment of prefects for a few weeks longer than usual. After the problems with the School Officers Guild last year, we want to be absolutely sure to appoint the right sort of prefects, who will lead through example and who will consistently display those core values I have just spoken about.

Whilst the rest of the new prefects will be announced at a special assembly next week, it gives me great pleasure to announce today that the Senior Prefect for 2019 is Mark Seneviratne. I wish Mark and his team well for the coming year and I look forward to working closely with them to ensure that Trinity is a place which exhibits the highest standards of self-discipline, honesty and mutual support; and to help rebuild the passionate school pride for which this great school once used to be so famous.

01. CHAPEL

As has been said and written the Chapel remains the heart of Trinity College. It gives spiritual foundation and direction to the Trinity community to continue its ministry to bring gentlemen into this society. Any old boy who comes here to pay respect to his Alma Matar and to rekindle his bond with the College spends a few minutes in this amazing place where anyone can really experience and realize the presence of peace and the feeling, "there is more joy in giving than receiving". Uplifting humanity is the main concern and purpose of education. The chapel with its amazing architectural structure and remarkable murals which reveal God's love, care and servant leadership endorse the above-mentioned purpose of this great educational institution. All the Chapel activities are planned and held in order to strengthen and enrich the spiritual and sacred dimension of human experience and the College community.

As usual regular Holy Communion services are being conducted on Sundays except for the third Sunday of each month throughout the year when school is in session. The Wednesday morning Holy

Communion service was attended by the boarders regularly. During the year, Tuesday and Thursday morning devotions were conducted by members of the staff, members of the SCM and on some occasions by special invitees. The staff service is held at the beginning of every term.

The organizing of chapel activities and various other related programmes have always been supported and strengthened, led mainly by:

- e) The Student Christian Movement

The Chapel Wardens during the year 2019 were Mr Ananda Marasinghe (Chaplain's Warden and Secretary), Mr Ruwan Jayarathne (Treasurer), Mr Palitha Senarathne (Warden), Mr Palitha Nawarathne (Warden) and Mr Shane De Silva rendered his service as the MIC of chapel activities. Mr Lasantha Tennekoon also plays a vital role in the chapel activities as the Choirmaster. Mr Palith Senarathne has been appointed as a Representative to the Diocesan council to represent the Trinity community for the year 2018/2019.

Amongst its important annual activities, the Welcome Service for Grade one students was held on the 9th of January. This year we added the Founders' Commemoration Service to the year plan and the service was held on the 18th of January. The S. Thomas' College and Trinity College combined service is an important event in the calendar of Chapel activities. The Festival of Choirs Kandy which is organized by the Bible Society of Ceylon was held for the 12th consecutive year on the 24th of June in the Trinity College Chapel. The Leavers' Service for the students who leave college after completing their Advanced Level Examination was held on the 3rd of September wishing them for their future endeavours. As we all know, the most awaited among all Chapel activities and the highlight of the year is "A Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols", the Advent Service. This year, the service was held for the 83rd-time on the 2nd of December first Sunday of Advent. Since 2016 the Christmas Eve service has been a prominent part of the Chapel calendar. We celebrated Christmas Eve service successfully for the 3rd consecutive year this time.

This year and the previous year we tried to get each section of the school involved in Sunday service allocating a Sunday for Junior School, Middle School and for Upper School. It was a momentous occasion in the year. The "Cantata", another form of worship or musical evening which was held on the 8th of April with the collaboration of the Cathedral Choir and Trinity College Choir received wonderful comments from many, who loved different involvements of the Chapel to uplift worship. The other extra event is the service that was held on the 11th of November to commemorate the Centenary of the Armistice Day; the end of World War I. The Old Boys who were attached to the forces attended this Service.

In order to organize all these activities in a proper way, the Chapel wardens, the Chapel Committee and many others played an important role in giving their time and energy.

Among them, the Trinity College Choir plays the main role to keep the chapel alive and energetic. They gave their fullest corporation during this year too for each and every event to bring colour and meaning to the existence of the Chapel in School life. In addition to their devotion and dedication to improve the quality of the worship, their discipline, commitment and creativity are a few other aspects that I appreciate as the Chaplain. The College Choir with their busy schedule was able to represent the College at some other important programmes where they gained a lot of experience to improve their skill and talent of singing. The Trinity College Choir is one of the well-respected and historic organizations that keeps Trinity College at its expected level. The leadership and guidance of Mr Lasantha Tennekoon as Choirmaster, and the support of Mrs S. Madasekara as the organist is remembered with gratitude. As the Chaplain, I am grateful to all the choristers and their parents for being with us in the journey of faith.

The Servers' Guild is an important arm of the Chapel, where the necessary assistance comes to the Chaplain during each and every Service to make his functions smooth. Mr A. P. Navaratne gave guidance for the Servers to improve their responsibilities and duties in the Chapel. This year we also encouraged more children to join the Servers Guild to get this exposure as Christians. The support that they gave during Sundays and Wednesdays during Holy Eucharistic service and in other important activities is much appreciated.

This year the Scripture School underwent a few major changes. After a long service, Mrs Caroline Gnanapragasam needed a break from the responsibilities of the Sunday School Teacher. Thus Mrs Mano kingsly and Mrs Malrani Jayarathne took over responsibilities to carry forward the Scripture School. Mrs Disna Gangahagedera and Mrs Shashini Wasundara also rendered their service as teachers from time to time. The time slot also changed and now the Scripture School takes place soon after the Sunday Service with the participation of boarders, day scholars and a few girls as well. At present, there are 30 children altogether attending the Scripture School regularly. As Scripture school children they attended a few programmes and at the year-end, they enjoyed taking part in the Christmas party. All the hard work of teachers, parents and others who came forward to help the Scripture School is much appreciated.

The Student Christian Movement also has an important role to play in the activities of the Chapel. From time to time a few attempts were taken to encourage more Christian boys to take leadership in worship and in other activities. Tuesday and Thursday morning devotion times were given to the SCM, as usual, to encourage younger children to come forward to use their talent and skills for the greater glory of God. On several occasions they organized Bible studies and prayer times in the Chapel.

As we have all observed there is desperate need to restore the murals of the chapel, a few steps were taken to see the possibilities and options to move forward. As professional assistance is required we have realized that steps forward should be taken carefully but progressively.

As the Chaplain, I would like to extend my heartfelt gratitude to those who have shared their resources, knowledge, talents, skills and time to enrich the ministry of God through the activities of the Chapel. I sincerely thank the Principal Mr Andrew Fowler-Watt for his leadership and co-operation. I thank the Vice-Principal Mr J. D. Wilson for his support and guidance. It is my duty and responsibility to appreciate and thank all the support, help, involvement and given by the Wardens, Chapel MIC, and all the teachers and staff members of the College for the activities of the Chapel. A special thank goes to all the staff members who reside inside the College premises and for the supportive staff members for their valuable contribution towards the Chapel. At this time I remember the hard work and commitment of Mr Joseph Marrriyasoosei, the Sexton of the Chapel who works to keep the Chapel a clean and pleasant place for everyone.

Finally, I wish to thank our heavenly Father for his Guidance, Mercies, Grace and Strength that he has poured upon us to continue his mission and to achieve many good things for the betterment of the Trinity community as a team. We pray and commit all our future endeavours to our Lord's hand for his Glory and Honour.

In addition to the above services the Library and Creative Learning Center has organized an annual Reading Month Programme to encourage students' reading habits and to increase the library usage and many programmes, and workshops were carried out during this year. The Trinity College Library Council held their first ever Human Library Project in Kandy on the 4th October 2018, with the distinguished Human Books Mr. Sanka Hettarachchi, Dr. Kanishka Ukuwela, Dr. V. Senevirathne, Dr. Nishan Dhamasena and Mr. Farweez Imamudeen. The Human Library is designed to build a positive frame work for conversations that can challenge stereotypes and prejudices through dialogues. We hope to continue and to involve the Kandy Community in this Human Library Programme.

The Old Boys from the Batch of 2000 in collaboration with the College Library Council organized a workshop on "Design Thinking for Youth" which was held at the College Main Hall on the 27th of July 2018 headed by Mr. Sanka Hettarachcchi and Associate Professor Suranga Nanayakkara (University of Auckland). This Programme was designed to nurture the young minds to develop skills on creativity and innovation which are two essential competencies that are required in facing the unknown challenges of the future career landscape. We are proud to host such a timely event that gave an inspiring and rewarding experience to our young students and we extend our sincere gratitude to all those who organized the workshop, especially Mr. Sanka Hettiarachchi.

In 2018 we purchased 287 new books for the collection, 2756 books were circulated among the students and teachers, and 375 literature searches were done for the students and teachers. We received 125 books as donations for the collection, and we are grateful to all donors and the Asia Foundation for the donations made in form of books which enlightened the knowledge of many people for many generations.

We continued to subscribe to local and foreign periodicals and newpapers to get current information for the staff and students. The National Geographic Magazine is available to readers in both physical and digital versions.



The history of the Library Council is highly distinguished and dates back to the beginning of the Library in 1874, when it was opened under the administration of the Trinity College Literary Association, headed by Mr. Clement Edward, and with the Secretary of the Association acting as the Librarian. This continued for several years, until it was finally handed over to the School administration.

The Library Council continued throughout the years, until about 20 years ago when it was discontinued due to the extensive changes happening in the Library. After the completion of the Creative Learning Centre by the Batch of 1996, the Library Council was re-established, culminating in the appointment of the student Library Curators.

The present Library Council is headed by the Librarian (Mrs. Achala Illangakoon), Curator of Archives (Mrs. T.D.D. Sumanasekara), the Assistant Librarians (Mrs. C.K. Arambepola and Mrs. N. The Trinity College Choir made great leaps and strides in the year 2018, with its Choristers being involved in various events with diverse genres of music. It is worth noting this year was led by three Choir Leaders who took their turns in each term.

The year started off with the high profile visit of the Earl and Countess of Wessex who visited Trinity College on 1st February 2018 as part of their visit to Sri Lanka in commemoration of the 70th Independence Day celebrations. The Choir sang the hymn 'God Save the Queen', the national anthem of the United Kingdom, followed by the Hallelujah Chorus which surprised the Prince as it was sung by a Sri Lankan School Choir.

The traditional joint service with S Thomas's College Mt. Lavinia took place on 18th February 2018 with Thomian Choristers coming to the School on the hill. The special combined item of the morning, "God So Loved the World" by Bob Chilcott was performed by both choirs as a special anthem, which filled the chapel with the angelic voices of a combined choir of more than 100 voices. The service attracted many visitors including several parents and well-wishers who travelled all the way from Colombo. The event was a absolute pleasure to host, as well as to interact with a school so closely tied to our own.

The annual Lent service, 'The Cross and Triumph of Christ' took place on 25th March 2018. The eagerly awaited service was commenced as the choir sang Henry Milman's "Ride on Ride on in Majesty" as they walked up to the altar. Bob Chilcott's "God so loved the world", J. Cruger and J. S. Bach's "Ah holy Jesu", Aleksandras Kacanauskas's "Christus Factus Est", Tchaikovsky's "Crown of Roses", Graham Kendrick's "The Servant King" and Antonio Lotti's "Crucifixus" were some of the musical works performed which inspired the congregation to a great reflection on the nature of Christ's death and resurrection. For the finale of the service, the congregation stood for Handel's triumphant "Hallelujah Chorus" which was conducted by the Principal Mr Andrew Fowler-Watt by special invitation as the previous year.

During the term holidays, the choir took part in the "Speechless" event along with Ishan De Lannerolle and the Choir of the Cathedral of Christ the Living Saviour on 08th April 2018. Throughout the musical performances, short messages were read, which reminded the congregation of the meaning behind the music. The songs each melded into each other, with bright rhythms and joyfully sung choruses. The audience was held in awe. It was also an excellent learning experience for the choristers to be exposed to a different musical style. The event was arranged by the Inner Wheel club of Kandy to collect donations for their charity work. The Choir took part in the annual Kandy Festival of Choirs organised by the Ceylon Bible Society, which was held in the Trinity College chapel on the 24th of June. They performed "Beauty for Brokenness" by Graham Kendrick, and "Jericho" an Old American Spiritual. Both songs were performed with an enthusiasm and dedication which clearly stood out. The Choir also commenced its practices in the 2nd term and during August holidays for its long-awaited concert.

On 17th September, the choir performed Mind Your Music 2018, in the College Hall. Every concert of Mind Your Music is centred around a theme to showcase a broad array of genres and eras. This year, the theme "Musicals to Movies" was intended to shed a spotlight on the many influential creations on film and on stage, and the music used in them.

Performed solely by the Trinity College Choir with live musical accompaniment on keyboard, guitar and drums, the 80 minute concert covered many genres of music and film: "Somewhere Over the Rainbow" from the Wizard of Oz, "As Time Goes By" from Casablanca, the "Ascot Gavotte" from My Fair Lady, The Pink Panther's theme, "Yesterday" from the Beatles' movie Help!, The theme to Top Cat, "Girl from Ipanema" from Get Yourself A College Girl, "Edelweiss" from the Sound of Music, "The Vulture Song" from the Jungle Book (sung A Capella by the Tenors and Basses), The James Bond theme, "Memory" from the musical Cats, the theme from Arthur, the Mr. Bean theme song "Ecce Homo", a medley of several of Batman's theme songs, "Blue Moon" from Manhattan Melodrama, "The Show Must Go On" originally written by the famous rock band Queen, "Goodnight Sweetheart" from the film American Graffiti (sung A Capella by the Tenors and Basses), and "Tomorrow" from the film Annie were all masterfully executed by the Trinity College Choir in a stunning show of versatility. This ambitious project was widely acknowledged as a massive success.

The Tenors and Basses of the Choir attended the Kandy Music Festival on 30th of September, performing two A Capella songs, "For the longest time" by Billy Joel, and "We're your Friends" from Disney's The Jungle Book.

The Choir became a part of history on 11th November 2018, as the 100th armistice anniversary of WWI was commemorated with a special Remembrance Day Service held at the College Chapel to remember and honour the Trinitians who served in WWI and in all other conflicts. After the service a commemoration ceremony was held in the Quadrangle with the participation of the Cadet Band, Cadet Platoon, Senior Scouts, Junior Scouts and the Choir, while the names of the brave Trinitians who sacrificed their lives for the benefit of many others were read out. The Choir sang "O God, our help in ages past" at the end of the commemoration.

The most awaited event of the year was held on December 2nd of 2018, the annual Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols. This years' service was special as it marks the 60th year since the traditional Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols was held at Trinity for, the first time in 1958. "Adam Lay Abounden" by Boris Ord, "O Little One Sweet" composed by J.S. Bach, "Virga Jesse" composed by Anton Bruckner, "Bogoroditse Dyevo" by Arvo Part, "In the Bleak Mid-Winter" composed by Harold Darke, "Quittez Pastuers" arranged by Stephen Cleobury, and Peter Cornelius's "The Three Kings" were all wonderfully performed, bringing a tear to many an eye in the congregation. For the finale, the chapel was lit only by candles held by the choir and congregation as the choir performed "Candlelight Carol" by John Rutter. After the service, the choir was invited to the traditional after service dinner at the Principal's bungalow.

Even after the school year ended, the choir was still active. The Tenors and Basses of the choir were invited to the "Celebration of Carols" event organised by Elizabeth Moir International School. The choir performed two solo items, "Born on a New Day" by Philip Lawson and Peter Knight, and "Ah Dearest, Dearest Jesu", by our own former Choirmaster Mr Ronnie Thangiah.

As the final event of the year, on the 24th of December, the Choir was part of the School's annual Midnight Service which was held at the Trinity College Chapel. The year 2018 commenced with a workshop which was organized by the SLU Chapter of Trinity College under the theme Reconciliation through Leadership. This was held on the 19th of September at the College Main Hall, which focused on awareness of the core motives of SLU amongst Kandy Schools and further enlightened them in their knowledge and interest for Communal Harmony and Co-existence.

Stride To Ride

"Stride To Ride" was a joint project organized by the Sri Lanka Unites Chapters of Trinity College, Kandy and Ladies' College, Colombo. The main objective of this project was to raise funds in order to donate bicycles to the students of the Reconciliation Centers, maintained by the Sri Lanka Unites Organization, whose main obstacle to receiving education is the distance the students are compelled to walk daily in order to get to the Reconciliation Centres.

The project was executed in two phases; Phase One: the fundraiser, dubbed as "Stride To Ride", and Phase Two: the donation of the bicycles to the students of the Reconciliation Centres.

"Stride To Ride" was held on the 17th of December, 2016 at the Thurstan College Rugby Grounds. It consisted of a charity run, which was graced by 300-400 participants, and a fair, through which the Sri Lanka Unites Chapters were able to raise sufficient funds to proceed with Phase Two of the project.

Phase two of the project was conducted in 3 segments and one during March and the others during the April vacation where we donated 20 bicycles each to 3 reconciliation centers situated in Mullativu, Moneragala and Kalmunai. We were also able to renovate the IT Lab at the SLU Reconciliation Centre in Matara.

The year 2018 was a very successful year for the Social Service Union; Although the Social Service Union was inactive for the last 5 years, the Union was re-established through the efforts of our TIC Mrs. Abeykoon and the Vice-Principal Mr. J.D Wilson.

The Social Service union engaged in two main projects and two sub-projects. They are as follows.

The Car Wash Project

The first project of the Social Service Union was the car wash project which raised funds for the Sirimavo Bandaranaike Childrens' Hospital. It was a very cumbersome task to organise a major scale event after the inactive period of the society. The Teacher-In-Charge Mrs. Abeykoon worked tirelessly co-operating with Mr.Wilson to make this event a success.

During preparations for the event members of the society divided tasks among themselves. Some students were in charge of preparing washing equipment, some were involved in preparing the car park and setting up various equipment such as speakers and cables.

The Car Wash was held on Sunday the 20th of May 2018. On the day of the car wash our members worked tirelessly to make the event a success. Each car was charged Rs. 300/= for a full body wash. The first car arrived at 9: 40am, followed by many more throughout the day.

Approximately 50 vehicles were washed by our members, some generous donors donating more than the usual price for a car wash. Many old -Trinitians who participated in this event expressed thier gratitude for continuing the noble deeds of the Social Service Union.

A sum of Rs. 20,000 was collected at the end of the event which I believe is a massive success for the society. The event was taken as example by neighbouring schools in Kandy and they organized thier own fund raisers.

Drop a Coin in Aid of Thalassemic Patients project

Mrs. Abeykoon instructed us to bring empty tins which could be converted into tills. Many students contributed to the project by bringing empty tins. During the intervals under the instructions of the Teacher-In-Charge we converted the empty tins into tills and placed them in every class from Grade 1 to Grade 13. We also placed two tills in the library. The amount of money collected from each class is mentioned below.

Junior School

Grade 3 – The students from Mrs C.P.K. Wijewardena's class contributed more than five thousand rupees.

Grade 5 – The students from Mrs Sharmini Wijeratne's class contributed more than five thousand rupees.

Middle School

Grade 6A – The students from Mrs Pethiyagoda's class contributed more than eleven thousand rupees.

Upper School

Grade 10E4 – The students from Mrs Hettiarachchi's class contributed more than a thousand rupees.

Grade 12E4 – The students from Mr P. H. Navaratne's class contributed more than a thousand rupees.

The overall amount collected from the entire school came to an approximate seventy thousand rupees. The Social Service Union extends its sincere gratitude to all those who have contributed for this generous cause and especially to the Vice Principal, Mr J.D. Wilson and the Principal Mr Andrew Fowler-Watt for patronizing the event and making it a campus wide project.

The collection was done in aid of a thalassemic child patient who is expected to undergo a matched related donor bone marrow transplant for thalassaemia major at Asiri Central Hospital. The cost of the procedure including

provision of the donor cells is estimated to be in the region of Rs 4,500,000, of which 70000 was donated from the Trinity College Social Service union.

The Social Service Union also donated money to a girls' home in Anuradhapura and also to a visually handicapped home in Battaramulla for the Flag Day.

In conclusion, on behalf of the Students of Social Service Union I thank our Teacher-In-charge for her tremendous effort, also our Principal, Vice- Principal, Head of Co-curricular activities / Upper School headmaster for aiding us in making the year 2018 a very successful year for the Social Service Union.

The Trinity College Model United Nations Club continued to increase its stature both within school and at a national level this year. The club continues its upward trajectory by attending more events, while taking a more prominent role among the Kandy Model United Nations clubs.

This year Trinity College was able to host the second ever Hill Country Model United Nations Summit in July 2018. The event consisted of a one-day workshop, followed by a conference the next day. This event was attended by several Kandy Schools. In this conference, the Trinitian boys acquitted themselves with skill, and Master H.S. Lukman Hassan was chosen to win Higher Commendation in the UNHRC committee.

The TCMUN also attended the 11th session of the Sri Lanka Model United Nations held in September 2018, on the theme 'Redefining Global Diplomacy'. This competition is an extremely good opportunity to learn debating and diplomacy, skills vital for the development of future leaders, as well as to interact with other students of many different backgrounds, forming important interpersonal and inter-school connections. This year, the students also participated in the UNICEF forum on the topic of the causes, effects and prevention of child abuse, and took part in the "UNICEF challenge", to spread awareness and propose solutions of this issue, through the eyes of children themselves.

In October 2018, the society attended the Pioneers' Expo organized by Model United Nations clubs of Vishaka College and D.S. Senanayake College. In this event, the students learned about such topics as the Sustainable Development Goals. The Trinitians focused particularly on the topics of "Quality Education", "Sustainable Cities and Communities", and "Peace, Justice and Strong Institutions".

We would also like to thank our Master-In-Charge Mr. Raveendran, for all of his constant support and hard work. As we close of this year, it is our hope that the club will continue to develop and grow for many more years to come.

It was a huge success and one of the key factors for the club to gain a recognition among the other clubs and societies, despite being new to the college.

During the second term of the year 2017, the possibility of relocating and reviving the old crest and the logo of the society was discussed and looked into, and since it was apparent that it was almost impossible, a new logo was designed, approved by the MIC and has now been officially approved at the time of writing of this report.

During the December holidays, a visit was made to the Pallekale Industrial Zone, to a metal fabrication facility specializing in cement containers and petroleum tanker manufacturing. Students from all grades in the Upper School took part in the visit, and the Chief Engineer of the facility, Mr. Bandara, being a parent of one of our members took his time explaining and showing us around the facility.

Students studied various methods of metal welding, cutting and forming, and finishing methods such as spray painting and sand blasting. They also had field lectures on various machines used in the metal work industry, including the CNC machines used to make precise cuttings of metal plates.

During the third term, a magazine that was in planning stages since late 2016 was brought to work, and various articles were collected. This magazine will contain articles related to many fields covered by the broad subject of Auto-motion and Automotive

Technology and Engineering. They will include reviews, diagrams and written articles submitted by leading companies and engineers, along with the society members. They will be reviewed and edited by the appointed design committee and the MIC.

A project of building a working model of a car, exhibiting the major systems (mechanical/electrical) in a working car utilizing the parts available in the Motor Mechanism room was put forward, and the DIMO Lanka, a leading company in the business has unofficially agreed to aid in assembly and maintenance. The preliminary work of sorting out and gathering basic components of the motor, transmission and wheels is already underway, and now awaiting further studies and processing.

During the April holidays of 2018, a visit to the DIMO Lanka facilities in Colombo was made, with the participation of 27 students of the society. The students gained very valuable experience in repair, maintenance and modern aspects of state of the art motor mechanics, and got the chance to see the latest and top class models by the leading company; Mercedes Benz Motors. Students were provided with lectures and visits to various facilities of repair, maintenance and sales centres.

The visit ended at the DATS training center, and there the students got an insight to the further options they can approach in the vocational path of automotive industry. Tokens were also given to the students as an appreciation of selecting the facility for the visit.

Altogether, year 2017-2018 was a highly successful year for the society. The members were exposed to professional automotive and mechanical engineering facilities, were given the opportunity to learn mechanical skills while utilizing their inventive talents, and received an environment in which they were able to follow their passion. We believe that the years to come will allow them even more opportunities to fulfill the motives of the Society.





AN INTERVIEW WITH OUR GAP YEAR ENGLISH TEACHER EDWARD GOMM

Most people outside do not know that we have gap year English teachers from the UK helping out in school, and apart from the Upper School students he teaches, the rest of us might not know Mr. Ed Gomm too well.

We at the Junior Trinity College Literary Association thought: Why not interview him and see what he really feels about the College and his stay at Trinity? He joined us for an interesting interview and we were impressed by what he had to say.

How long have you been in Sri Lanka?

I arrived in Sri Lanka on the 2nd of September last year [2017]. So, about 9 months so far.

Which part of the UK are you from?

I am from a small little county in England called, 'Rutland'. It's right in the middle of Britain. It's also called the 'East Midlands'.

What do you think of Trinity? What got you interested to come here and teach?

I think teaching is a potential career path of myself. Instead of travelling after University, my mother asked, "Why not work and travel at the same time?" It so happened that the Principal is a close friend of ours. So, we got in touch with him, sent a few mails up and down and two months later here I am!

What do you think of the boys here at Trinity?

The boys here are nice but irritating at times like any other school boy, like I once was. But they all have 'Hearts of Gold'. And, they are always willing to stick up for each other. That's the reason why Trinitians have got a good reputation.

Like I said they are all lovely guys!

What do you think about the extension of school hours and the introduction of clubs and societies during the lunch break?

I think it's important that clubs and societies have been introduced. My old school clubs and societies were very important for all round development. So there's no point (in my eyes) being an excellent academic or an excellent sportsman, if you can't then balance it out with other interests and passions. It won't get you the distance you want to go in life.

And, school going on until 3 o'clock doesn't bother me, because when I was your age sometimes I finished school at 6pm and started at 8am. So you guys complaining about 3 o'clock, you don't know nothing!

How would you describe Prince Edward's visit? Have you met Royalty before?

No, this was my first time I met royalty. It was a lovely occasion. Not very often do you get to meet Royalty and speak to them in person. And it was Sri Lanka's 70th Independence, so all in all it was a lovely day.

Any sports you take an interest in?

I like lots of sports. I rate myself distinctly average in most sports apart from rugby and water polo, which are my two main sports. I joined the 1st XV team in their training sessions as well.

I like playing hockey and cricket, although I'm not very good at them. But I HATE football. One of the very few Englishmen who hates football.

You helped us with our drama The Secret Case of Sherlock Holmes. Any other extra-curricular activities you take an interest in?

I haven't actually participated in many extra-curricular activities other than sports. But if the opportunity arises I would love to take part, and the drama was fantastic. After I made corrections to your pronunciation and accent, I thought the drama really changed quite a lot. Very funny from the start to the end. Thoroughly enjoyed it.

How different is Trinity from the school you attended?

Very different. My school had 1,100 students. It was a mixed school. I joined in Year 6, so I studied there for 8 years. We also had 'Saturday School', an idea that most of you boys would hate. It was very different, but both equally good.

Which part of your stay did you enjoy the most?

So far, I've not liked the rainy season, limits what I can do. Obviously, living away from home, there's been ups and downs. But, it's definitely been a fine experience and wonderful memories. Very fortunate to travel around the country with the school, and able to help out the way I can. Lots of treasured memories that I can take back home.

Which section of Trinity attracted you the most?

When I first came here I was told to help in the Junior School, but due to my temperament and the way I am, personally I didn't think I would be best utilized down there. Ever since then I've been teaching English in the Upper School.

I've loved coaching Rugby to the U12s. I've thoroughly enjoyed that. But, I'm happy to go any way. It's all lovely and extremely friendly.

We gained a lot from your stay here, what did you gain from working at College, anything you didn't expect?

PATIENCE. I had the worst patience. Trinity has taught me to be a very patient guy. There's a very special bond between everyone in this school which is lovely.

I've just grown up a lot and learnt to be more mature. Trinity has given me a lot of responsibilities and I'd like to think that I've left a good mark and an impact in the school.

How was the Hostel?

The hostel has got a giant screen tv, a jacuzzi...... No, it doesn't......

Ha-ha, It's been perfect. I've got a lovely comfy bed, a warm shower (which no Sri Lankan seems to like!) I've got a small fridge, a kettle, my cup of tea in the morning. It's got everything I need.

Was it easy to settle down here in Sri Lanka? How long did it take?

Couple of weeks. There was the excitement. Being away from mum and dad, living on my own. Different country, different culture. That whole excitement of learning about a new culture. Being in a completely new environment I've never been before. So that was really exciting. But, suddenly you feel "Oh God, I miss home!"

So, I think after about a month or so I started to find my stride, luckily there has been amazing members of the staff, the boys – they really helped me settle in. To be honest it's a constant process of settling in.

How has the food been compared to what you get in the UK? We heard about your first meal on the Chapel lawn and how you acted after you ate the kiribath, anything you can say about that?

So, a quick story.

Back in England, I was rubbish with spicy food. The spiciest food I could eat was a chilli flavoured packet of crisps.

After the Staff Chapel Service it was my first time meeting everyone. A lovely breakfast laid out, and they warned me that the kiribath and the sambol might be a bit spicy. I thought, I could do a 'bit spicy'. I didn't know what you guys meant as a 'bit spicy'. So, I bit into what I thought was a piece of chicken, but it turned out to be a pepper. My face just turned red and I started to cry.

At this point they thought it would be nice to introduce me to the Vice Principal. So, with the greatest difficulty I put my words together and said, "Hi, I'm Ed." But, I couldn't say anything after that cause my mouth was on fire.

Luckily now, I'm good with spicy food. But, that was an absolutely horrible first experience of Sri Lankan food.

What is your favourite book?

Oh, my favourite book is 'The Power of One' by Bryce Courtenay. It's about a young South African boy. I would recommend it to any one.

Who is your favourite author?

C. J. Sansom. He is Scottish writer who wrote many historical crime novels.

How has Trinity treated you? Any regrets in coming to Trinity?

No, no regrets. I try to live life without regret. Like I said, the school has been very welcoming. If I needed help the staff never hesitated to do so. I've really enjoyed my time here. I hope the final two months would be a nice 'Cherry on the Top of the Cake' to round off what I think has been a fantastic year! Also, I hope the boys have enjoyed their time during my presence.

How has the weather treated you?

I still can't cope. It's far too hot sometimes. Anything over 27C or 28C is far too hot for me. The weather was a culture shock. As I stepped out of the plane in Colombo this wave of heat just smacked me in the face. I started sweating. So that was a wake up call for me to start changing my choice of clothing.

What do you think is lacking in Trinity?

The one thing I have noticed is that the boys are afraid to ask questions when they don't understand. They should realize it's okay not to know something. No one will make fun and laugh at them. So, I think they should lose their fear and stick their hand up if they don't understand something.

When are you planning on leaving?

Term ends on the 3rd of August. I have a flight at 3 am on the 4th, so right after the term ends.

Any plans on coming back?

Well, unfortunately not to teach. But, I'd love to come back to Sri Lanka and visit all my friends here and see if any of the boys I met are still schooling.

As for the very last question, if you were to rate Trinity say from a scale of 1-10, how would you rate it?

An easy 10. Trinity has been very kind to me, although at times it has been tough. I can't fault anything.

We thank Mr. Ed Gomm for taking time off his busy schedule to be with us and share his experience in Sri Lanka and, of course, at Trinity.

"THE BOARDING" - A SPEECH BY JEFFREY ARUMUGAM

We all might pause to think, "What exactly made Trinity 'the best' in all?" For most of us, being day-scholars, it is quite difficult to picture how it must be like to be a boarder at Trinity. However, the following speech by **Jeffrey Arumugam (Grade 11)**, at a Friday assembly on 13th July, drew a picture in the minds of all those who were listening:

"Today I thought of speaking about a topic which is not spoken of highly, it is about boarding. As you all might know, in the past, the heart of the school was considered to be the boarding. Which I believe should be the case at present as well.

Boarding was started in the year 1898. As I was told by many seniors of the boarding, it was started by Trinity's best ever Principal, Rev. A.J. Fraser to make the school more popular. It's known to everyone that Fraser's era is considered to be the golden era of Trinity.

Rev. Fraser gave admissions to the students all over Sri Lanka, because he had boarding established. Everyone would agree that it was Fraser who made Trinity "the best school of all!"

But I'll add to it, he first made the heart strong by bringing boarding up to an exceptional level. Which ultimately paved the path for Trinity to begin its journey towards becoming the best.

Now, let me tell you about life in boarding:

The day starts in the boarding at 5:00 am. After that we are provided with tea arranged in the dining hall. After we have the tea, we move to our dormitory to dress ourselves at around 6:00 am, School Officers come for inspection. After that we move to our classrooms for prep time. Then, we have our breakfast at 7 o'clock. After having breakfast, we move to our assemblies or to our classes.

This shows all of you how we are trained to manage our time. In the lunch interval we come to the dining hall to have our lunch, and after school ends we usually play or attend our various practices and return to the boarding.

Before studying we are taught to clean our dormitory. This shows how much we are taught to maintain our self-discipline. We start studying from 6:30 to 8:00 pm. Then, we will have our dinner at 8:00 pm, and we go to sleep at 9:30 pm.

In boarding we are taught to:

Manage our time
Maintain our self-discipline
Organize ourselves
Control our emotions
Respect and care about each other
Satisfy ourselves with what we have
To celebrate the diversity of culture in Trinity

As a boarder I have many dreams to achieve. Not only me, my fellow boarders as well as our boarding masters. All of us want to bring Alison and the Napier houses back to the way they were in the good old days. You might be aware of the greatest men that boarding has produced in the past like, M. Kagwa, the Prime Minister of Uganda and Mr Lakshman Kadirigama, one of the most distinguished politicians in recent years.

We wish to have more boarders in the years to come, and to improve some standards of the boarding. I would particularly like to change the food menu! The time is insufficient to explain about every aspect of the boarding at Trinity. But as a boarder I urge all of you to try being a boarder at least once during your span as a Trinitian!

I would also like to tell you about our boarding masters. Mr Alex Lazarus, the 1987 league winning coach, who is our head boarding master. If we do anything wrong he will punish with his well-known punishment known as the "Wewal kasaya." I can't explain the "wewal kasaya" you would have to feel it!

Mr. Sivalingam always wants us to pass our exams. He especially wants me to pass my Tamil which is my first language. In the beginning of the period he always shouts at me, but by the end he is joking with me.

I thought that I should tell everyone that, despite losing my beloved blood relatives, I've earned a new family that is complete in all aspects. Today I feel the comfort of being taken care of, supported and valued within my heart.

I will finish off by quoting an extract from the current Senior Prefect's first speech after joining boarding.

"It's true that it's not rainbows and sunshine all the time, but at the end of the day if you can sail through the storms and make sure that when the going gets tough the tough gets going. That's when you rise as a true Trinitian!"

As a proud boarder and a present Rydeite, I urge all of you gentlemen to experience the boarding life which I assure you is worth every minute.

I would like to leave you all with the motto of Ryde house, finis origine pendet – the end depends upon the beginning.

A long round of 'applause' was given after the speech by everyone present at the assembly, as the speech was considered "awe-inspiring" and "different".

Trinity College was prominent as a Boarding School since its inception. "Boarding life" has an immense contribution towards grooming a fully-fledged Trinitian. The hostels have always been metaphorically referred to as the "backbone of college". We believe it is a place which inculcates and preaches values which beyond the boundaries of a classroom.

A Trinitian is trained to be methodical, independent and selfless. It is a practical learning curve towards creating an excellent team player who could handle all adverse circumstances in life.

Often, parents from all around the island and the world have sent their children to Trinity boarding, expecting to offer them a new dimension in education. Royal families in Uganda, Ghana, Brunei and Maldives to respectable communities in China and the Middle East have sent their children to the hostels of Trinity since the days of old. From Colombo to Batticloa, Jaffna to Matara; dormitories consist of students who belong to numerous ethnicities, religions and castes.

As commented by the Principal at the same assembly, the current boarding system only facilitates 3% of the entire student body of Trinity whereas 100 years ago more than 50% of Trinity's population used to be boarders. However, the restoration of Alison and Napier Houses are in place as a part of the Trinity150 celebrations. We believe the new proposed structure of the boarding system will provide a better and comfortable living environment to all the boarders at Trinity and would improve the percentage of boarders magnificently in years to come!

A KING'S GIFT - THE CAPTURED GERMAN MACHINE GUN

Overlooking the quadrangle stands a priceless monument that recounts a great era of the College's history, the German machine gun. This is considered to be one of the first notable war trophies presented by the British Emperor to Ceylon after the First World War, and the first school outside England to be honoured this way.

For almost a hundred years it has been a proud testament to the contribution Trinity made towards the Great War. A tally of 65 men from Trinity (including Principal A.G. Frazer) had fought in the war. 13 sacrificed their lives, 18 were wounded, two were taken prisoner and three were awarded commissions.

Amongst the gallant warriors the names of Richard Aluwihare, Albert Halangoda, Frank Drieberg, Ajit (Jik) Rudra, Aelian Pereira, H.E. Garvin, John Andrew and J.W.S. Bartholomeusz stand out. Aelian Perera was awarded a commission with the Durham Light Infantry and J.W.S. Bartholomeusz received the Croix de Guerre of the first class for his valour. It was because of their bravery and sacrifice that the school proudly embraces its war trophy.

The machine gun is a Maschinengewehr 08, or MG 08. It was a standard German machine gun during WWI. The MG 08 had been captured from an enemy camp during a victory march. It was on the 16th of October 1919 that Sir William Henry Manning unveiled this hefty memorial on behalf of King George V.

In his speech the Governor lionized the College, "To me Trinity College has a record and a Roll of Honour of which it may be justly proud. I find that 65 masters, men and boys gave their services overseas during the war and of these 65, there were no fewer than 33 casualties – 13 killed, 18 wounded, and two taken prisoner by the Germans. Now that is 50% of the number that proceeded to the battle front. It is a record, I repeat again of which Trinity College may well be proud of – a record, I am sure you will agree with me, which any battalion, any regiment, any unit of His Majesty's service would be proud of." A platform was made for the machine gun with blocks of rock from Asgiriya, on the bank beside Alison House.

The glory days of this gun are long gone. Now it rests upon its rock cradle, reminding us of bold men such as General Rudra and Richard Aluvihare. The Maschinengewehr 08 has witnessed the school twist and turn from the days Ceylon liberated from England to its dark hours during the civil war

The gun keeps in our minds that Trinitians rise up to the situation no matter how hazardous it may be. Engraved upon its brass plate are the words: "Captured German Machine Gun, Presented to Trinity College by Majesty the King at the Conclusion of the Great War (1914-1919), in which 65 Members of this College served and 13 gave their lives."

1972 TRINITY'S CENTENARY YEAR - A WALK DOWN MEMORY LANE

This article was originally published in a TCK Centenary Group's newsletter

In February this year (2018) when I joined a group from the Colombo Branch of the TCK OBA for the presentation of "Smart Boards" to the College Kindergarten, my mind went back to 1959. That was 59 years ago when I sat on the floor in the old Kindergarten hall; with the cement coloured in red, gold and blue oval lines, huddled together among a bunch of anxious five year olds.

Sixty six boys were admitted to the lower Kindergarten of Trinity that year. Though the old Kindergarten hall is no more, replaced by the "Centenary Block" and most of the lovable old teachers gone to the great beyond, the feeling of being back in my boy hood home was dream like even for a 64 year old!

It was wistful nostalgia for the entire group that went up to Kandy for this presentation Walking up to the Main hall car park from the Kindergarten, we found the physical environment of TCK changed and different to what it was half a century ago. We lamented the demolition of the quaint old "Mission House", TCK's very first home, for a grotesque concrete monstrosity to stand there instead. We also admired some of the new developments that have retained the overall architectural character of the school campus. Above all, what was heartening was to learn that the Grand Old School appears to be in safe hands, well and healthy, at the ripe old age of 146.

It was the five year olds of 1959 and the many friends who joined us on the way through Junior, Middle and Upper School that grew to be the 18 year olds to hold aloft the red, gold and blue banner in 1972 when TCK celebrated her centenary. We were small in number then. In 1959 the entire school may have had a thousand boys on roll. Even by 1972, we numbered 1500 more or less, with some A Level classes counting 6-7 boys! Hence to make the "TCK Centenary Group" as we call ourselves, large enough to be a movement of impact, it was agreed that all who were in the 5th form, lower and upper sixth form classes (grades 10,11 and 12) in 1972, be included in it. What a wonderful agreement that was! The camaraderie that prevailed at TCK cut across a few years difference in age or grade. With almost two hundred in our group we are now a happy and proud arm of the larger TCK family, wrapped together in the red, gold and blue standard.

As for this column, I was somewhat taken aback when our dear friend and evergreen Trinitian Channa Jayawickrama called me from Kandy a few weeks ago asking me to write a piece for the group newsletter. Momentarily I asked myself, why me did Channa call? After all, we had amongst us Ajith Samaranayake, the boy who was destined to be one of the finest English journalists in Asia, DMG (Dimma) Dissanayake, Ubayasena Banda and many others whose literary contributions while school boys were good enough for national publications. They could have "out written" me by "leaps and bounds". Then sad stark reality struck me. Of the names I mention, they have all crossed the great divide and it is left to lesser mortals like me to chip-in in the absence of the better.

I am unable in this article to make reference to all those from our group who have moved on to the great beyond. Perhaps that is done elsewhere in this newsletter. I cannot however, restrain myself from making reference to the likes of the two Rohans (Alawattegama and Paranawitharana) who left us far too early in life, Rugby Lion Y. S. Ping, that steel hardened Napierite P. Maheswaran whose death was a surprise to us all, and the rough and tumble

Shathi Bahar. Shanti having enlisted with the Navy sacrificed his life in battle for the sovereignty of Sri Lanka. The portrait of Commander Bahar now adorns the walls of the OTSC in Asgiriya with some of the finest Trinitians who left their imprint on the sands of time.

In writing this piece, I thought it best to go down memory lane to 1972 and recall how we celebrated our Centenary. It was an event looked forward to by the entire Trinity family. From Thanksgiving services to exhibitions and carnivals, drama festivals and a city walk to cap it all! All activities were organized by a group of dedicated old boys, teachers and the boys themselves. "Event Managers" were not around then! Forgetfulness compelled me to seek assistance from the College archives and fading photographs in my own albums.

The celebrations began in November 1971, to coincide with a visit to then Ceylon by the Rt. Revd R.W. Stopford, former Principal (1935-41). He was by then the Lord Bishop of London. There was a traditional Thanksgiving service presided over by the good Bishop at the College Chapel.

What preceded the service was a spectacular procession (city walk) from the Hall to the Chapel, winding its way down D. S. Senanayake Street, Kande Veediya, Kotugodella Veediya, Cross Street, back to D. S. Senanayake Street and to the Chapel. It was led by the Senior Prefect Ravindra Sangakkara carrying the College flag. Ravindra, later a Professor of Agriculture at Peradeniya met with a fatal accident just over a year ago; we remember him with affection. The procession represented the entire Trinity family; from former Principals, staff, old boys, minor staff and, the boys walking under their "House" flags.

I vividly recall the lanky athlete G. T. A. Samaranayake now in the USA, Rugby Lion Jeffery Yu now in Canada, the amiable Ajith Senewiratne now in Australia, that steely rugby inside three-quarter Tissa Dissanayake now in retirement from the hotel industry, and myself leading the boys, carrying the Garett, Lemuel, Alison, Napier and Ryde flags respectively. What a show that procession was; half mile long and Kandy was there in numbers to watch its "Glamour School" on parade at home!

1972 saw the main celebrations. By then our Senior Prefect was Athula Unanthanne. He also led TCK at rugby and cricket that year. The centenary Prize Giving in February broke new ground in more ways than one. The Chief Guest was Madam Sirimavo Ratwatte Bandaranaike the Prime Minister. Not only was she the first politician to have graced a TCK Prize Giving as Chief Guest but, also the first female to do so. Then again, with almost all her family; father and brothers, being Trinitians the good Lady was not a stranger to the school. In fact, she was very much a part of it. The highly acclaimed 400+ page TCK Centenary souvenir printed in our very own press on the "Two Page Pedal Machine" was launched that evening. The centenary exhibition opened alongside the centenary Prize Giving.

The exhibition was truly massive in terms of a school boy activity. It showcased the variety that Trinity had to offer in terms of art and craft and the sciences in all its multifarious forms. One exhibit was a "Model of DNA charts on its biochemical functions". The credit for this went to three boys: Ruwan Ekanayake now a leading Cardiologist, Asoka Balasuriya who went on to complete a PhD in the field of chemistry having played rugby as well for Trinity, and A. M. S. Bandara a very bright student whose steps after leaving school I have not been able to trace. Taking into consideration that the molecular structure of DNA was first identified only in the 1950s in Cambridge, exhibits of this nature reflected on the extremely high quality of what was on display.

The centenary exhibition was open to the public. Almost all schools in Kandy and many from the Central Province and a few from Colombo as well were attracted to it. What was to be a 5 day exhibition was extended to nine days with the doors closing only around midnight in the last couple of days.

As for student academic achievements, one might argue that the 1972 A Level class was too preoccupied with our centenary celebrations to concentrate on public examinations. Regardless, we still have amongst the group many who have made their mark at the highest levels. A few names that readily come to my mind are those of my Ryde House mate Professor Thangamuttu Jeyasingham Vice Chancellor of the Eastern University, Professor Asoka Nugawela the respected agricultural scientist, and Kandy's very own Walter Perera who was appointed to the Professorial Chair of English at the Peradeniya University.

Festivities continued in to March. A drama festival, talent shows and musical evenings were on the cards for a full week or more. A "Mini Fair" in and around the College car park and the old bus garage was the "grand finale".

The drama festival was also open to the public. Plays were staged by the TCLA, SLU and the TLU. The "West Side Story" by the TCLA in which rugby flanker Babu Dharmaratnam now in the USA, played "Riff" and another ruggerite Stewart Wright now in Australia acted as "Bernardo" was a hit. The Late Ronnie Thangiah the choir master with the golden voice was the man behind the production.

Ediriweera Sarathchandra's "Pabawathi" was staged by the SLU. Francis Wickramage the talented "Sinhala guru" trained the cast.

D. Beling a burgher boy played the lead role of Pabawathi with great aplomb. Donald Fernando who was Alison House Master in later years was King Kusa, while the "narrator" was this writer. The main actor in the Tamil Play "Eatharakkum Oru Theerppoo" was the much loved Tamil teacher N. Selladurai himself, supported by the likes of J. R. Jesubatham now in the USA and M. V. Siddharthan an ardent "Sivaji Ganeshan" fan. I was saddened to learn that Siddha too is no longer among us today.

Many of the boys of 1972 will recall the "Mini Fair". It was a "Trinity family" affair with games and amusements, music and trade/food stalls. It also gave the boys a rare opportunity of mingling with the girls of Kandy in an atmosphere of levity in days when the mere holding of hands was something often frowned at. The "fair" brought to an end the celebrations as far as the students were concerned. What was unique about the centenary was that there was no boy or member of the staff who was not involved in what was going on, in one way or the other. It belonged to "US ALL" and we were proud that it did!

Whereas it had all ended for the boys, there was in store for Trinity a greater show in August of 1972. Led by the OBA and a committee chaired by Colonel Stanley Ratwatte, they ran the "Jaya Mawatha Esala Exhibition" for 12 days. It was in reality the Bogambara Perehara Carnival. On each of the 12 days it was opened by a distinguished old boy or other dignitary and, in the true "Trinity family" spirit, the final day honours were carried out by the minor employees of the School. "Sharing and caring" was a value instilled in us at TCK!

No doubt the "carnival" would have brought in a substantial sum to the college coffers. In those days however, organizing public carnivals and matters of high finance were not in the "curriculum" for schoolboys. Not in the "Extra – Curricular" either!

To Our Teachers:

We entered TCK in a year (1959) the Prime Minister of Ceylon was assassinated. That was a rude shock to a fledgling democracy. Gender barriers were falling apart and lady teachers came into the Upper School by the late 1960s. We were senior students in 1971 when the first youth uprising took place. In 1972, when it was time for us to step out in to the real world, the "Soulbury Constitution" gave way for our nation to become the "Republic of Sri Lanka" from the "Ceylon" we were accustomed to. While we were carefree and happy in the world that was "Trinity College" our country was in the throes of change; at the beginning of what now seems an unending struggle to find an identity of our own.

We were then in our most impressionable years. Our teachers did not insulate us from the happenings outside; we were encouraged to discuss and debate the challenges facing the country but, they kept us safe from any adverse impact of the social turbulence around us. We are ever grateful to all of them. Tall among them stood, the awe inspiring Cedric Orloff, the master mathematician G. Y. Sahayama, the effervescent Lionel Fernando and that iconic Liberal, Hilary Abeyaratne. We salute them all with gratitude!

AN INTERVIEW WITH MR LIONEL PERERA

Mr Lionel Perera, as the oldest living member of the Trinity family, has established himself amongst those who attend the numerous events in the Trinity calendar, especially cricket and rugby encounters along with events held in the Chapel. While speaking to Mr Perera, we realized that he is a fount of information on Trinity history and culture. It would be a shame not to share these lovely stories, and with that in mind, we bring to you an interview of this distinguished personality. He joined us on 7th of November at his alma mater for an illuminating session.

Could you tell us about yourself as a Trinitian?

I entered College on the 31st of May 1928 and the Principal was Rev. John MacLeod Campbell. I left on the 9th of August, 1943. So, I knew no other school. I was at Trinity right throughout.

After Mcleod Campbell retired in 1935, he was succeeded by Rev. R. W. Stopford, who later became Bishop of London. So, he was at Trinity only for about 5 years and then he retired.

I have told this to so many people but I'll repeat it again:

Shortly after I left College, I met an old boy and he asked me about my career at Trinity. He asked me which house I had been in. I said Garret. Then he asked me if I had played any cricket in College. I said the only cricket I had played was rubber ball cricket in the quadrangle. When he asked me if I had played any rugger, I said I have not even handled a rugger ball. When he asked me if I had taken part in athletics, I said no, not even in a house race. In our time, the house race was the race in which non-athletes competed. Then he looked me up and down and said "I say, you must have been one of those 'soththa' day boys who just came to school and went back home! "

How were sports at College in your time?

The first time that we were beaten by a school at rugger was in 1932. I still remember the headlines in the 'Sunday Times'; 'Trinity College Beaten at Last: Splendid Victory for Zahira'. That was 86 years ago.

The first time after I came to College that we had an unbeaten cricket team was in 1937. Our captain was O. L. Izadeen. We beat Wesley by an innings. Wesley were all out in the first innings by 36 runs. We beat S. Thomas' by 8 wickets at Mt. Lavinia. My God! They had us by six runs in the first innings; second innings they were all out for 22 runs, and we won by 8 wickets.

Then that year we beat Royal, S. Thomas'. Josephian and Antonian matches rain interfered with play on both days and both matches were drawn.

Then in 1939, the Captain was G. P. Schoorman. In all my years at Trinity, that was the only year that we beat St. Joseph's. And that was remarkable because we didn't even have our captain. Our Antonian match that year was won by an innings, and was over by the lunch interval, and our star bowler got a hat-trick in both innings! The first Trinity- Antonian match played at Katugastota was in 1938 and we won by six wickets.

How was the discipline?

My Gosh! Trinity boys were gentlemen, men! I don't know whether this is true, but one of my friends once told me that a British Governor had said "Men of Royal and men of S. Thomas', but gentlemen of Trinity!"

What do you remember of the Staff?

They were quite different. We had a number of English masters on the staff at that time. Now, before my time at Trinity, there was a Rev. Pilcher. He was a great man, for social service. He used to take the boys out from the Social Service Union to the Katukele slums and he used to get into the drain first with his broom, clean it, then give it to the boy behind him and tell him "Now, man, it's your turn!". A great

gentlemen to the Mahaiyawa community, and when he left it was they who missed him.

Shortly after Pilcher came to Trinity, he had expressed a desire to study Sinhala, and so a Sinhala teacher was arranged for him. One day, after the lesson was over, the teacher respectfully took his leave of Pilcher. He said "Avasarai". Now, the word 'avasarai' was new to Pilcher. He immediately handed his umbrella to the teacher and said "Awwa sarai nam, menna kude."

What were the clubs and societies like?

As I told you, I was one of those day boys, I never joined but we had DSLU which was the Day Scholar's Literary Union. Then of course you had the Houses also and we had the Astronomical Society and Trinity College Literary Union.

(How famous was the TCLA during that time?) That was very good, we had our Annual Debate against S. Thomas'. So many people came, but I'm afraid I never attended any of those! So many teachers and sometimes visitors used to speak at the TCLA.

How was going to school during the War?

I left College in 1943, while WWII was still in progress. Our principal at that time was Mr Simithraaratchi. You know, the whole of the Junior School was commandeered by the government for the War! I don't know how they managed to accommodate all the school staff and the boarders! The whole of the Junior School was taken over!

How was the boarding during you time?

I was never a boarder! (Laughs)

How did you see the boarders as a Day Scholar?

In my time there were so many boarders in my class.

(How was their behaviour?) In every school there are rioters you know? You can't say that they were all saints! You must have your fun.

What is your fondest memory of College?

Well, my fondest memory is that my parents sent me to the best school of all! There are others who may not agree with that, but one of my greatest joys is that I had a son whom I was able to send to Trinity.

There are several loyal old boys who for different reasons have had to send their sons to other schools, but for me to have sent my son to any school but Trinity would have been a real heartbreak.

What did the Chapel look like in those days? Was it the same?

I was confirmed in the College Chapel on the 16th of March 1940 by Bishop Horsley. He was the English Bishop of Colombo. There was no Diocese of Kurunegala at that time. Stopford was the Principal.

In 1935 just before Rev. Campbell left the Chapel was dedicated. (The current chapel?) It was the College Chapel and it was on a Sunday. It was the Chapel of the Light of the World. I know in the Sunday Times the whole of one page was devoted to this dedication.

What was the duration of the school day?

From 8 o'clock till 3 o'clock. But earlier when we were in the Junior School I know school used to end at 2.20 in the evening.

How were the buildings?

Well, when we joined College in Kindergarten this new Kindergarten block was not there.

I remember there was a kottamba tree, and our second standard was under the kottamba tree.

How was the School Officer's Guild? Did they help in maintaining discipline? At that time, prefects, monitors, they were allowed to carry the cane and allowed to cane at that time.

(Did they help to uphold the discipline of the school?) Not really. They used to discipline the boys, they didn't want our help, but during my time at Trinity, there were several boys from other countries, from Siam, India, and Africa.

Now, when I was in College, the pocket money that boarders used to get was 25 cents a week. The richest boy in College was a Burmese boy, his father owned a rice mill. His pocket money was 1 rupee a week and people used to say 'My God! That chap is getting 1 rupee a week!'

Those days we had what were called "squares" in the tuck shop, 3 cents a square for aluwa, dodal. And, the toffee was 1 cent each.

How much did you pay for school fees?

When I joined College in the Kindergarten, the school fee was 5 rupees and 50 cents. Then in upper Kindergarten it was Rs 6.50, second standard Rs 8.50, third Rs 9.50, fourth 10.50, and I think the highest fee was in the London Matriculation which was 19 rupees or 20 rupees. Those were the days!



As we wound up our interview, and Mr Lionel Perera was proceeding to his vehicle, he left us with a final piece of advice;

"Naki venevata behethak na!" (There is no cure for old age!)

A GLIMPSE OF THE PAST: REV. ALEXANDER GARDEN FRASER

If Ireland Jones founded Trinity, Rev. A. G. Fraser was the one who truly made it the "best school of all." Many of his contributions to the school still shape Trinity to this day, and he is often referred to as Trinity's greatest principal.

Before Fraser came to Trinity in 1904, the school was in decline. Discipline had deteriorated under his predecessors despite their best efforts. Boys skipped school and teachers ignored their classes. For example, Vice Principal Rev. A. MacLulich once went for a walk around the lake late at night and encountered several Trinitians returning home after a drunken party.

Fraser had his work cut out for him. It is recorded that only a couple of days after his arrival, the new principal had to cane a hundred boys in a single session. This situation was made even more astounding by the fact that the average age of a fourth form boy (equivalent to Grade 8 today) was recorded as 21 years, never mind the higher grades, while Fraser himself was only 26! But a new system was introduced which changed everything. He simply elected four boys to look after the other boys. This was the beginning of the Prefect system.

With the selection of those four young gentlemen, he introduced a system that carries on to this day, and is still one of the most important institutions in the school. Soon the system was extended to introduce Monitors and Prefects which has been developed to the current procedure that governs the School Officers' Guild.

In the next two years, a drastic change was seen in the school. School work improved, discipline went from Trinity's greatest shame to one of its defining features, and attendance shot up to ninety eight percent, although of course, the school was far smaller then, with only about 500 students compared to the 3200+ we have today.

Another significant accomplishment by him was initiating the building of the Trinity College Chapel, easily one the most iconic buildings in the whole school.

Before the Chapel was created, the school worshipped at Oakley's church situated on the same site as the current main hall. However, Fraser was dissatisfied with Oakley's church and, in a letter, he complained the church was "the dirtiest and meanest building on our compound... We cannot improve the building or do anything to it, we cannot even put flowers in it for Easter day... the Sinhalese congregation is going down slowly because of its narrow exclusiveness... largely Trinity boys and the girls from two nearby mission schools that keep it going."

He decided instead to create a chapel especially for Trinity College. Although the first foundation stone was laid near the site of our main hall, it was soon moved to the old cricket pitch, which was the highest place in the school – "the most commanding site on the compound."

The man who designed the Chapel, Rev. Gaster, was a gifted architect. While spending a holiday in the ancient city of Polonnaruwa, he was inspired by the traditional Sri Lankan architecture he saw. The influences are clear to see when pictures of the old temples

and the chapel are compared. The Chapel is perhaps the finest monument to Fraser's belief in fusing the best of East and West.

Many wanted a western style of design, but Fraser and Gaster were determined and forged ahead. Today the Chapel is one of the loveliest places in Trinity, or even in Kandy. Truly unique, it is one of the jewels in Trinity's crown.

The creation of the Asgiriya cricket ground is another accomplishment that was achieved through Fraser's hard work and passion. In the beginning, the fields available for sports at Trinity were limited, and small. As previously mentioned, the old cricket grounds were situated at the current site of the chapel and by comparing that relatively to the size of modern Asgiriya, it is clear just how cramped conditions were.

Fraser was conscious of the need for a proper cricket field since his arrival, and in 1910 he was able to acquire eight acres which today forms most of the Asgiriya Cricket grounds. At the time, however, it was a steep hillside. The staff and boys themselves helped in levelling the ground. When he was warned that heavy rains would wash the soil away, Fraser, inspired by Dutch methods, had under-surface drains built to prevent the soil being washed away. In the end Fraser's cricket pitch, had the honour of hosting international matches with teams such as Australia, England, Pakistan and the West Indies.

Fraser was also gifted as an educationalist, for example, introducing Sinhala and Tamil into the classroom years before the government did. He believed that it was necessary for the students be fluent in their mother tongue, being shocked to find that when he first arrived in Trinity, many students who wished to serve their country did not know a word of Sinhala or Tamil! Examination results improved tremendously, becoming as good as, if not better than, any other school in the island. Fraser's belief in a complete education consisting of physical and mental training still carries on today in modern Trinity.

When considering Fraser's era, there are several facets which stand out. One significant characteristic was his unique approach to education. He believed in an education that had both local and international elements. Although he wanted boys to know their mother tongue and their culture, the education at Trinity was global in outlook, so much so that, during his time, boys of 17 different nationalities made use of the all-round education which Trinity provided.

Second, he was never afraid to be different in the pursuit of his goals. Fraser did not bow to the conventional wisdom of the time, and steadfastly followed his vision for the college. Third, it is often not recognised that he was by no means universally popular at the time. His actions were always calculated to produce long term gains, often ahead of the times. A good example is the plan he announced in his 1908 Prize Day speech. Fraser's new scheme included the introduction of science to the standard curriculum along with the teaching of Sinhala and Tamil languages. Half a century later, much of that plan had become standard government policy. This was also considered an iconic upgrade to the School's Policy.

Finally, Fraser did not accomplish all this alone. Trinity at the time was lucky to have some gifted individuals who were loyal and steadfast in their support, such as W.S. Senior (the Bard of Lanka), Rev. Gaster (the architect who designed the Trinity chapel), Mr N.P. Campbell (the pioneer of social service at Trinity) and Miss Valesca Reimann (A great teacher and a historian who wrote about Trinity), all of whom played an integral part in the rise of Trinity College Kandy.

When Fraser left in 1924, it was truly the end of an era. He left for Achimota in Ghana. He made such an impact there, that he was honoured as one of the men who contributed to their independence.

The Oxford Dictionary of National Biography, which is by no means produced by Trinitians or Sri Lankans, chose to honour Fraser with an entry which describes him as "the finest colonial headmaster of his day."

Trinity is thankful to have been served by such a great man whose personality is still admired by Trinitians 'young and old'.

FOUNDERS' DAY COMMEMORATION SERVICE 2018

Trinity College was founded on **17th January**, **1872**. Commemorating a hundred and forty six years of continuous existence on the same premises is something any institution would be proud of.

To mark the Founders' Day at Trinity, a commemoration service was organized on 18th January 2018.

History of Trinity College, Kandy

Though Trinity College records its continuous existence from 1872, it started with a small mission house built by Mr. and Mrs. Browning in 1823, where the current Wickramasinghe building stands, which functioned only as an elementary school.

Rev. Ireland Jones is recorded as the founding father of our school, who started it as the Kandy Collegiate School in 1857. It is stated as follows about Rev. Ireland Jones:

"It is as an ardent and ideal missionary he will ever be remembered in Ceylon. Many men gratefully acknowledge the magnetic influence of his personality in shaping their lives, and implanting within them those qualities which tend towards the betterment of the community. His sermons were always impressive and caused conviction. An earnest delivery, a natural eloquence, profound scholarship, careful study, combined with mental powers of a rare order, produced a preacher, who attracted crowds and left a lasting impression behind"

Having started the school, Rev. Jones retired after 3 years to engage in his calling in evangelistic work. The school for some reason closed down for sometime before it was started again in 1872 as our beloved Trinity College Kandy.

On the 17th of January 1872, the Rev. Richard Collins reopened the Kandy Collegiate School, which was then renamed as our beloved Trinity College Kandy, recognising what the school owed to its founder Rev. Ireland Jones, who was from Trinity College, Dublin. It is said about Rev. Collins:

"Mr. Collins was a man of varied gifts and talents. He was not only skilled in verse; he was not only a writer; he was also a musician. He was again, an artist and his love of science showed itself in varied ways in Ceylon. But above all he was a Christian Minister and a missionary with the outlook of a statesman"

The humble beginning of Trinity with Rev. Collins had only four buildings in the school which included Mr. Browning's Mission house. The School also had only 139 students in its first year under Rev. Collins.

The real strength of Trinity has lain over the years in the long line of remarkable men and women who have served there. It all began with Rev. Collins' teaching staff of four: Mr. Alfred Clerk – The Head Master, Mr. Clement Edwards – Teacher and Choirmaster, Mr. Andrew Loos who started the Literary Association, and Mr. Perera.

Trinity was not built in a day, neither its traditions nor its buildings. It has had the unique advantage of growing gradually in the same premises over a hundred and fifty years, sometimes slowly, sometimes rapidly, and, on occasion with bursts of remarkable energy. It has remained and continues to grow as a closely knit community on its own little hillside of over 20 acres.

The dynamic and outstanding characters of our founders are embedded into every aspect of Trinity today. A citizen of the world called a "Trinitian" has to be, therefore, obviously unique.

We thank God for our priceless heritage as a school, as we commemorate our founders' day. As we remember and rejoice, let us make every effort to capture in our thinking, emotions and spirit, the tremendous commitment of our founders in order to take their mission forward, and be inspired to add our own selfless efforts for the years to come.

The Earl and Countess of Wessex then spent some time with the Heads of the School and Special Invitees before their departure.






































"THE SECRET CASE OF SHERLOCK HOLMES"



On Saturday, 24th of February 2018, theatre lovers in Kandy gathered at the Trinity College Main Hall for a night of culture, fun, and enjoyment with the full – length production, "The Secret Case of Sherlock Holmes", presented by the Trinity College Literary Association. Before "The Study in Scarlet" and "The Hound of the Baskervilles", the world's greatest detective had to face a challenge that leads to him to travel through time and space itself to solve a case that readers of the Doyle books would not be familiar with.

The mystery comedy has Holmes and Watson accidentally stumbling across a time machine built by the renowned inventor H.G. Wells which transports them to the 21st century. Ironically, they end up at a mental institution where they meet a vampire, an American president, a British Monarch, a serial killer, and many others as they are forced to solve a case to clear their own names from a crime of murder.

The drama delves into the personal crises of Holmes as he struggles to comprehend the cultural and progressive changes of the new millennium, while simultaneously writing himself in to a manuscript that will see him emerge as the familiar detective we know, with his deerstalker hat, magnifying glass, pipe and violin.

The night was a culmination of nearly three months of hard work, sweat and tears for the cast and crew of students from the Middle and Upper section of the College. At the helm was Mr. Aslam Marikar – no stranger to the Sri Lankan theatre scene, having written and directed "Anarchy" and "21st Century Monk" – as Master-in-charge of the Trinity College Literary Association, providing guidance and expertise to the young actors.

A special mention must also go to the parents of the cast, providing their assistance in whatsoever situation that arose. The support given to the boys by the Principal along with the rest of the administrative staff also helped towards the successful production of the play.

This is the first full length drama production staged at Trinity in 15 years, and it played to an audience of over 400.

The audience were kept constantly in laughter by the antics occurring on and off the stage, with characters appearing in the middle of the audience and the balcony. The story was a fusion of past and present, with references to current world events which many of the audience could relate to.

At the end of two hours of glee and hilarity, the cast and crew were given a lengthy ovation in recognition of their effort. The one and only woe of the night was the departure of five senior members of the cast and crew, having reached the end of their school days at Trinity, who were brilliant and regular members of not just the TCLA but also participated in many other activities in the College.

The Trinity College Literary Association hopes that the night of the 24th will be an inspiration and motivation for not only just Trinitians, but also for other students in Kandy to take up theatre as a hobby or subject worth studying.

By harnessing the creativity and talent of its students the TCLA successfully continues its 144 year history and proves the sentiment that Trinity College is an institution which provides a well-rounded education for its students.

REMEMBRANCE DAY - CENTENARY SERVICE OF THANKSGIVING

On the 11th of November 2018, a special Armistice Centenary Service was held at the College Chapel to remember and honour the Trinitians who served in WWI and in all other conflicts.

The service commenced at 9.30am with an opening hymn "All my hope in God is founded" sung by the College Choir, which was followed by the welcoming and opening prayer by the Chaplain, Rev. Sanath Madagamgoda.

The Principal, Mr Andrew Fowler-Watt then recited the poem "In Flanders Fields" by Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae. The poem speaks about McCrae's preoccupation with death and how it stands as the transition between the struggle of life and the peace that follows. It is written from the point of view of the dead. It speaks of their sacrifice and serves as their command to the living to press on.

Lt. Col. Leonard De Alwis (former Principal) was also invited to the occasion. He spoke about the "Men of Trinity in bravery and sacrifice" and about the determination that Trinitians had shown to serve the country as well as their school.

Shortly after the chaplain's sermon, the prayers of remembrance and intercession were performed by a fellow chorister.

The Chaplain dismissed the congregation to the quadrangle to witness the commemoration ceremony by the Cadet Band, Cadet Platoon, Senior Scouts, Junior Scouts and the Choir. Mr Ananda Marasinghe (Co-Vice Principal) read the names of the brave Trinitians who sacrificed their lives for the benefit of many others.

Then a member the Cadet Band played "The Last Post" to respect and honour those who had served.

To conclude the ceremony, the Choir sang "O God, our help in ages past", and the Cadet Band proceeded with the National Anthem.

"As we commemorate the centenary year since the end of World War I, it is not to romanticize or glamorize war that we remember this fateful journey in the lives of men who sacrificed their lives for peace. It is merely to share with everyone, that these soldiers were mere schoolboys who suddenly became soldiers, suddenly became men and fought with great valour and distinction in that savage war as they went from the playing fields of Trinity to the killing fields of France."

A FESTIVAL OF NINE LESSONS AND CAROLS 2018

Once again it was the time for one of the most anticipated events in the Trinity calendar – held this year on the 2nd of December 2018.

The service comprised nine readings from the Bible, each followed by carols which has relevance with the reading. The choir is known for singing in several languages, with Sinhala and Tamil having been made a standard part of the tradition since 1964.

This year's service was special as it marks the 60th year since the traditional Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols was held at Trinity for the first time in 1958, and was undoubtedly a memorable evening of worship and praise to all those present.

The evening commenced with choristers coming in procession, descending from the Principal's bungalow to the Chapel holding lamps. The Chapel was lit only with candlelight imbuing it with a tranquil and beautiful atmosphere. The traditional solo of "Once in Royal David's City" was sung by a Chorister from Grade 6, the Choir joined in harmony at the second verse, accompanied by the organ, as they gracefully proceeded towards the Choir stalls.

As the opening carol "Adam Lay Abounden" by Boris Ord was sung a sense of wonderment filled the air as the congregation pondered upon Adams first ever sin leading up to the birth of Christ. This was also the context of the first lesson which was read by a chorister from Grade 7.

Next was a Sinhala carol "Sandun Vimanen" which was accompanied by the organ along with the traditional thabla and thalampota.

Upon the conclusion of the second lesson, a moving rendition of "O Little One Sweet" composed by J.S. Bach, reminded the congregation of Christ's birth and how the son of man was yet once a meek and sweet little child.

After the third lesson a Tamil carol "Andhi Neram Vaadai Kaalam" was sung. This was a clear depiction of the versatility in the choir's choice of carols, which was accompanied by the same instruments used in the Sinhala carol.

The fourth lesson was accompanied by "Virga Jesse" composed by Anton Bruckner. The complexity of this composition was quite notable as it brought about a sense of serenity with its impressive harmonies and also a feeling of rejoicing towards the end of the carol.

The carol "Bogoroditse Dyevo" by Arvo Part told of the message the archangel Gabriel gave unto the mother of God in conjunction with the fifth lesson. The choir's capabilities were clearly brought out by this performance and it was commendable performance sung in the Russian language.

The next carol "See Amid the Winter Snow" had three soloists: an alto, a bass, and, keeping in line with recent years, an Old Chorister soloist. The chapel filled with grandeur as the chorus to this carol was sung; rejoicing in the glorious birth of Christ.

The carol in relation to the sixth reading was "In the Bleak Mid-Winter" composed by Harold Darke. It comprised two soloists: a treble and a tenor, who were gradually accompanied in angelic harmony by the choir. This truly brought about a depiction of a cold and desolate winter time in which Christ was born in Bethlehem.

Once again adding to the variation in the language and style of the carols performed, a French carol "Quittez Pastuers" arranged by Stephen Cleobury, was sung adding to the grandeur of the worship which resonated with the faithful and praising hearts of the congregation.

The next carol had three soloists who sang throughout, accompanied by the choir: Peter Cornelius's "The Three Kings" was sung by soloists who each represented the kings while the Choir sang the chorale. This particular performance was the perfect illustration of Christ's godly nature and royalty as well as his humanity.

After the carol "Hark the Herald", and the congregation lit their candles and the lights of the chapel were switched off. The choir then began to sing the "Candlelight" carol. The simple but beautiful harmonies combined with the chapel lit only by candles to a truly spectacular and moving atmosphere that warmed and tugged on the heart of all who were present.

As per tradition, the carol "O Come all ye Faithful" was sung as the Choir recessed to the west door, to end the last verse with a triumphant descant, marking the end of the Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols. It was interesting to note that the Chapel continued to be lit only with candles until the end of the service.

"A Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols" was based on an order drawn up by E. W. Benson, later Archbishop of Canterbury, for the use in a wooden shed that served as his cathedral, for Christmas Eve 1880 in Truro. It has since been adapted and used by other churches all over the world.

A. C. Benson recalled: 'My father arranged from ancients sources a little service for Christmas Eve – nine carols and nine tiny lessons, which were read by various officers of the Church, beginning with a chorister, and ending, through the different grades, with the Bishop'.

The history of the carol services at Trinity is an interesting one. With records commencing from 1935, all carol services have been somewhat similar to the 'nine lessons' tradition with several lessons, except for the one in 1954 where there had been only two lessons with 16 Carols. In 1950 the carol service was broadcast over the BBC world service.



















MIDDLE SCHOOL SOCIETIES AND CLUBS - A REVIEW OF 2018

Societies and clubs

While there are a great number of clubs and societies on record in the Middle School of Trinity College Kandy, until very recently, a significant number of these were dormant and their activities somewhat hidden.

However, this year the newly implemented co-curricular programme led to a bustling schedule at the Middle School.

The school hours were extended until 3.00pm, and each club was allocated a time for meeting during this new designated half-hour period with their member of staff in charge. Students were asked to select clubs that they wanted to be a part of and then attended meetings based on a standardized time table.

A former member of staff, Mr K. Antonydas, was also recruited as the Director of Co-curricular Activities to manage all co-curricular activities and ensure their proper functioning.

The revival of many fabled societies such as the Junior Literary Association was an exciting experience to both staff and student bodies. However, many new societies such as Media Club and Culinary Club grabbed the students' attention as well.

The staff members successfully steered the enthusiastic students with many inaugural projects. Apart from the teacher or master in charge, a student committee was appointed. This included the usual roster of President, Secretary and Treasurer as well as other additional posts. Logs of time and achievements were kept throughout the year in order to track the progress of the clubs.

The grade 8 and 9 students were mainly involved in the various committees, giving them invaluable experience for the years to come. A few societies worked in collaboration with all sections of the school to organize memorable events.

The following are some of the new and existing clubs and societies that were active this year: The Social Service Union, Sri Lanka Unites Chapter of Trinity College, Junior Wildlife Club, Junior Astronomy Society, Adventure Club, Junior Literary Association of Trinity College, Culinary Club, Aquatic Club, Bird Watcher's Club, Photography Club, Scrabble Club, and Chess Club.

Amongst the events this year the Junior TCLA's Literary Marathon, Environmental Pioneering Brigade's Environment Conservation Programme, Sinhala Literary Union's Sinhala Day 2018, Social Service Union's Food Fair and the Culinary Club's Christmas Food Fiesta stood out. The fact that most of these events were based on social service is a distinctive feature.

As with any new introduction, a few shortcomings have been observed over the year. One such was that due to certain restrictions the full organizational and management capacity of the students was not totally recognized. A few activities that were planned were also cancelled in the final stages of their preparation.

Despite beginning it all with a small beat, the music has clearly just begun. As it was told to many committee members, 'The initiation doesn't have to be perfect. Perfect comes with time'.

We hope that the projects in line with the Trinity 150 programme will mean more technological involvement in the activities of the clubs and societies, as well as in basic procedures such as obtaining permission and acknowledgement of activities through electronic means rather than the traditional paper and ink.

House activities

Great interest was taken in the house activities that were established along with the new clubs. A sense of friendly competition prevailed around the students; and with the students organizing their own events and competitions, a great deal of responsibility and discipline was expected from the youngsters.

Many inter-house friendly competitions were organized for students of all age categories. These events were organized mainly under the leadership of the relevant MICs for the sport and included Inter-house chess tournament, scrabble tournament, rugby house matches, hockey tournament and basketball house matches.

Weekly house meetings were conducted grade-wise to build strong bonds within the houses. Debates, skits, singing and dance performances were done at the house meetings under the guidance of the respective house masters. The teams for the inter-house tournaments were also decided at house meetings. Each house had an organized committee led by a House Captain to support the teachers.

Conclusion

As well as their own agenda, the Middle School students actively participated and supported many events organized by the Upper School. The Middle School students contributed to the Trinity College Choir, TCLA Drama Club, Trinity College Western Music Society, 17th Kandy Scout Troop, Cadet Platoon and Band.

The young sportsmen in the weight lifting team, junior rugby teams, boxing team and athletic teams also gave their utmost for the school.

The new system has shown exemplary results in the Middle School, and this can be seen in the sheer volume and quality of club based activities that have been conducted throughout the year, many of which have been reviewed on the school website. Awards and recognition have also been given to those who have excelled and this is a good number of students across all grades.

The staff members being asked to volunteer to take over clubs and societies in Middle School while the students were given the freedom to choose what they prefer were one of the notable changes made this year.

It is plain to see that the new clubs and societies policy has changed their operation for the better, resulting in immense benefits for both the College and the students. We hope to see it continuing to be a success in the future with its introduction to the Upper School next year.
